## The Rabbi's Discretionary Fund to focus on congregants in distress

Starting now and for the balance of my service as your rabbi, all funds donated to the Temple Israel Rabbi's Discretionary Fund will be disbursed for one purpose: to help Temple members in financial distress. The word "all" means exactly that: while there are other acceptable uses for the fund, I am committing to use the fund for congregant assistance only.

Is your fellow congregant in distress? You might know; you might not.

Money problems are not necessarily the most painful sources of suffering, but one thing is true: they are among the most easily solved. From time to time one of your fellow congregants falls upon hard times and needs assistance beyond what the social service organizations in our community are able to provide.

The Rabbi's Discretionary Fund is

exactly that: A Temple fund that is used at the Rabbi's discretion. The funds may not be used for my personal benefit, and are under the control and oversight of the Temple Board. This is why your donations are tax-deductible. While I regularly report the categories of expenditures to the Treasurer, the specific disbursements to those in need are confidential.

And there are definitely those in need. You might not know it, but from time to time I know it, and I can assure you that it's a painful thing for me to know and not to be able to help.

You can help me to help them. Just write a check to the Temple Israel Rabbi's Discretionary Fund. I will take care of the rest.

### Kristallnacht observance at Shabbat service Friday, Nov. 3 at 5:30 p.m.

On Nov. 9–10, 1938, the Nazis staged vicious pogroms—state sanctioned, anti-Jewish riots—against the Jewish community of Germany. These came to be known as Kristallnacht (now commonly translated as "Night of Broken Glass"), a reference to the untold numbers of broken windows of synagogues, Jewish-owned stores, community centers, and homes plundered and destroyed during the pogroms. Encouraged by the Nazi regime, the rioters burned or destroyed 267 synagogues, vandalized or looted 7,500 Jewish businesses, and killed at least 91 Jewish people. They also damaged many Jewish cemeteries,

hospitals, schools, and homes as police and fire bri-



gades stood aside. Kristallnacht was a turning point in history. The pogroms marked an intensification of Nazi anti-Jewish policy that would culminate in the Holocaust—the systematic, statesponsored murder of Jews.




