"I have two-and-a-half questions for you..."

What's the difference between the Torah and the Talmud?

What's the difference between Orthodox Judaism and Reform Judaism, and how does Conservative Judaism fit into the mix?

These are not new questions, but my answers to them continue to evolve, thanks in no small measure to my interaction with you. Whenever I explore old topics with you, they become new to me as I view them through your eyes and, of course, through your questions.

This month my Basic Judaism class continues with an examination of our sacred literature and our various Jewish approaches to it, past and present. There is only one session because, well, because it's December. Next month we'll continue with a full brace of four sessions, the first of which will explore the different Jewish movements.

Remember that these sessions can be taken as "drop-in" stand-alone programs, so feel free to come as dictated by your schedule and your interest level in the topic. The public is invited, so you're always welcome to bring a friend, Jewish or not.

Sisterhood has set up at the Temple an opportunity for the sharing by exchanging.

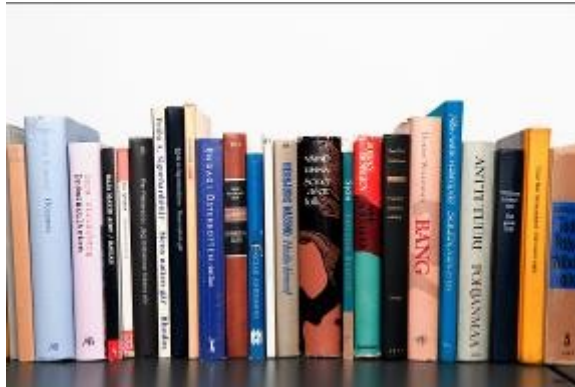
How does it work?

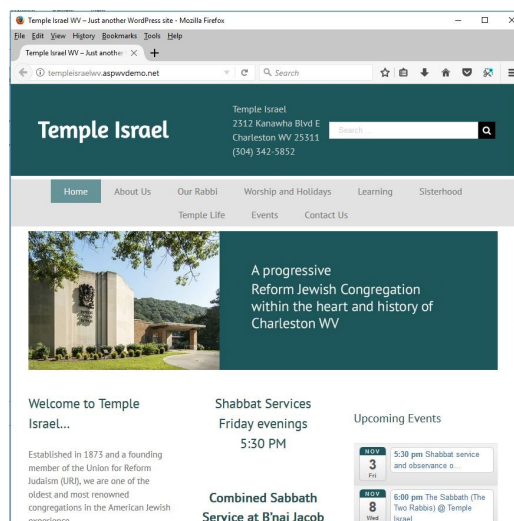

Manna Meal gets new executive director; please remember those in need by donating non-perishables; WV tax credits available by contributing to RCCR and Covenant House

The Social Action Committee collects donations of non-perishable groceries for both the Covenant House Food Pantry and Manna Meal. You can drop off groceries at the Temple – in a basket outside the Chapel – and they will be delivered to those organizations.

Covenant House Food Pantry. Please donate whenever you can, especially canned tuna, breakfast cereal and canned soup. Many other items are also welcome – please contact Anne Fishkin for details.

Manna Meal. Needs include canned and powdered milk, peanut butter and jelly, canned soup; canned meats: chicken, tuna, sausages, Spam and Treet; macaroni and cheese mixes, canned spaghetti, tomato sauce with meat, spaghetti noodles. **Easy-open/pop-top cans are especially welcome.** Please see the inset on this page, an excerpt from a recent Manna Meal letter to the congregation.

In addition to Covenant House and Manna Meal, the Temple is also a founding member of RCCR, the Religious Coalition for Community Renewal, which provides low-income housing, recovery from homelessness, and services for first-time home-buyers. All three organizations help make a better life for many Kanawha Valley residents and provide assistance to individuals as well as community solutions to homelessness and poverty.

West Virginia tax credits available by contributing to RCCR or Covenant House by Dec. 31

Both RCCR and Covenant House are participating in the West Virginia Neighborhood Investment Program (NIP). Donors may obtain this state tax credit by giving a minimum donation of \$500 to a NIP-qualified organization such as RCCR or Covenant House.

For example, when you contribute \$500 between now and Dec. 31, 2017, to either RCCR or Covenant House, you will receive a \$250 tax credit, reducing your state tax bill by \$250. This means your \$500 donation will really only cost \$250, and so on.

Businesses and individuals that contribute to a NIP-qualified organization are eligible to receive 50 percent of the contributed amount in the form of state tax credits. Donors may use the credits to reduce liability for the Corporate Net Income Tax, the Business Franchise Tax or the Personal Income Tax.

At press time, credits were still available from both organizations.
