Rabbi's message Confirmation at May 18 Shabbat/Shavu'ot service

In the nineteenth century, Reform Judaism brought into the Jewish world the ritual of Confirmation, borrowed from the Christian world and adapted to Jawish needs

the Christian world and adapted to Jewish needs and contexts. Originally this Reform ritual of Confirmation replaced Bar Mitzvah for thirteenyear-old boys. Later, it was revised to be a year of specialized curriculum for sixteen-year-old boys and girls.

Eight years ago, I introduced the idea of "Adult Confirmation." Our Confirmation Class of 2010, pictured above, consisted of a group of students who "confirmed," as an end-product of a process of careful study and exacting exploration, a commitment to Judaism and to heim Jewish life.

At our Shabbat service at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, May 18, the


Confirmation Class of 2018 will lead us in worship and read the

Torah portion (the Ten Commandments) from one of our scrolls, in culmination of their group study over the past year. We celebrate Confirmation along with the observance of Shavu'ot because the festival of Shavu'ot is associated with the legend of the giving of Torah, and therefore with the broader value of all Jewish learning.

In addition to matters normally taken up at our annual meeting, the Congregation will consider amending the Temple's Constitution to reduce the size of our Board from 12 to 9 Trustees. We will also have a guest speaker, Mr. Mark Levin, an architect from Levin/Brown Associates of Baltimore, Md. Mr. Levin will speak on the process of the renovation of sanctuaries and related spaces, which is a subject being explored by the recently appointed Sanctuary Renovation Committee.

Following the annual meeting will be the congregational dinner, which is free for Temple members. So that we have enough food prepared and seating arranged, please RSVP for the dinner to the Temple office no later than Wednesday, May 2.

You don't need to make a reservation to attend the meeting.



- If you can, supply your own work gloves. We have extras if that is a problem.
