From the rabbi's desk

Dear Temple Israel Congregants,
Community members, and Friends,

Shalom, and Greetings!

February was quite busy, in a good way. On our calendar we had a full list of activities. In addition to the covered dish dinner at the beginning of the month and weekly Shabbat services, our First Shabbat Torah study was well attended and we had some interesting conversation. The Introduction to Judaism course touched on lifecycle events, and there was a lot of interest and many questions, causing us to expand the coverage of that topic. Introduction to Hebrew covered several more letters, drawing closer to the end of the text. The Winter OLLI course kicked off with good attendance and participation in the examination of the four concepts selected. Our scheduled pulpit exchange (where Rabbi Urecki delivers the sermon at Temple Israel and I do the same at B'nai Jacob Synagogue) again was fun and seemed well received.

The Board and committees were very active as well; in part because they are doing the things that they are intended to do, and in part because it is time for them

to generate and submit budget requests for the coming year. I am happy to say that the committee work has produced some interesting and exciting possibilities, and the board has been very active with all the different efforts and initiatives, and I hope that the congregation will enjoy and appreciate all that has gone into these efforts when the results are reported.

I was able to participate in the CARLA clergy group meeting, and attended a meeting with other clergy to learn about some activities that are ongoing in the area.

A major highlight for me was the opportunity to work with a couple from Israel to assist them in the adoption and conversion of their child, which included a visit to the Mikvah and a Brit Milah! The Beit Din (rabbinic court) was constituted of Rabbi Jordan, Rabbi Urecki, and me; this was the culmination of four months preparation. It was joyous and a delight.

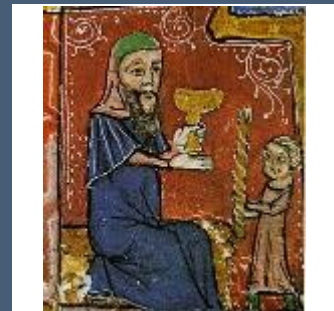
As always, I was honored to be permitted to serve as a pastoral presence to some of you.

Pre-kindergarten: \$2

PLEASE call this number to contact him for any reason.

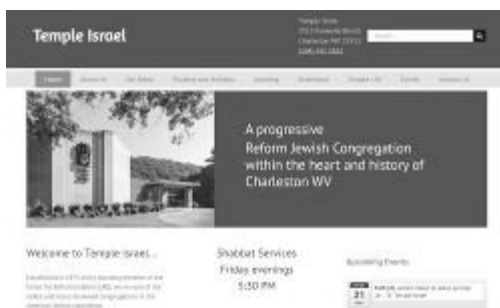
Messages on the Temple office voicemail will be checked periodically, but it is best to call the cell phone number.

Friday Shabbat Service and Covered Dish Dinner

Our next Shabbat service with a Covered Dish dinner is March 1. Bring food – or if you can't (or if you forget), just come anyway – I can't imagine anyone will go away hungry. And remember that the next one is April 5! The service begins at 5:30 PM and the dinner follows immediately afterward.

First Shabbat

The next "First Shabbat" will be Saturday, March 2 at 10:30 AM. We will have a short Shabbat morning service, followed at approximately 11:15 by a Torah/Text study, and a nosh. The parashat hashavuah (weekly reading) is Vayakhel, Exodus 35-38. It is also Shabbat Shekalim.

No prior knowledge is required. You only need to have interest, curiosity and be able to read English! Join us for an uplifting service and a fun conversation. If you can't make it this month, we will meet again on April 6, looking at Tazria, which falls on Shabbat HaChodesh.

Havdalah and...

I have selected a documentary that is inspiring and uplifting, a Holocaust-related story that is heartwarming and positive, showing that one person really can make a difference. We will watch and discuss "The Power of Good." There is no need to RSVP – just show up!

Charleston Death Café

Please consider attending a Charleston Death Café. They are scheduled for Sundays, March 17, April 28 and June 16 at the Temple, from 6 to 8 PM. Charleston Death Cafés are free, and we invite anyone

interested to attend. The facilitator will be Rabbi Joe Blair, who has facilitated Death Cafes since 2015.

What is a Death Café?

What could be nicer? A cup of tea (or coffee), a little cake, a chance to talk about death....

It used to be that one would never speak in polite society about money, sex, religion, or death. It seems that the last of the taboos today is death – but being taboo does not eliminate the need to discuss it.

Death Cafés leave taboo at the door and death is the topic of all conversations. Nothing is right or wrong, no view or opinion is censored or judged, those attending are welcomed and supported by others present, and there is no agenda. It is simply a supportive and comfortable setting to raise issues and discuss matters around death.

The aim is to increase awareness of death to help people make the most of their (finite) lives. Death Cafés are NOT Therapy, and they are NOT counseling. They are facilitated conversations, set and determined by the attendees. Nothing is sold or pitched, and no one is judged.

It can be about your concerns: your own feelings about death, an experience related to the death of another, the process of advance- and pre-planning, practical/logistical issues around death, or any questions you want to ask. Death Cafés are not affiliated with any religion or product, they have no agenda, and there is no sales pitch or pressure.

Death Cafés have been going on worldwide since 2011, with over 7500 official cafés held (and others as well). You can read about the organization here: <https://deathcafe.com/>

Death cafés are often drop in – no reservations required for most of them (though this varies by location).

What we ask: we do ask for contact information from those attending so we can send notices (usually emails) of the

Social Action Committee Report

How Social Action works in the URJ; next Temple Social Action meeting March 4

Social Action Committee's Feb. 4 meeting was well attended. Rabbi Blair sent a message of appreciation for the committee's support of the Tu Bishvat Seder and for the work of Anne Fishkin and her crew in providing the symbolic holiday fruits for each table.

Anne was our presenter at this meeting. Her history of the Temple's Social Action Committee, as well as the workings of the URJ's Religious Action Center (usually referred to simply as "the RAC") and the Commission on Social Action of Reform Judaism, including their most recent priorities regarding issues of conscience, was motivating and informative. Anne recounted Temple initiatives dating back to 2001 that included many issues of conscience the congregation pursued on its own and with the wider Charleston community, through social justice forums and interfaith projects and dialogues. Also remembered were the leadership and contributions of many Temple members, whose commitment and energy for social justice have motivated so many of us and on whose shoulders we stand.

Anne shared her experience as the Temple's delegate to the Commission on Social Action, the body responsible for developing resolutions regarding social justice positions that are sent to the Congress of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) for authorization. The RAC's mission is to promote these priorities through education and advocacy. Anne reminded us that social activism, including advocating on be-

half of issues and legislation, is supported and encouraged by the URJ, except for support of individual political candidates or parties.

The RAC's social action topics are Economic Justice, Environment, Public Health, Civil Rights, Interfaith Affairs, Church-State Issues, International Issues, Immigration and Women's Rights. Its 2019 legislative priorities are confronting climate change, racial justice, a humane immigration system, responding to the global refugee crisis, realizing LGBTQ equality, religious freedom and separation of church and state, access to affordable, quality healthcare for all, preventing the scourge of gun violence, support for Israel, responding to the genocide against the Rohingya people, pursuing economic justice, women's equality and economic rights, and resisting anti-Semitism, white supremacy and all forms of bigotry.

The committee appreciates Anne's hard work and excellent presentation, which will guide us in our efforts toward Tikkun Olam, the repair of the world.
