#### From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Temple Israel Congregants, Community members, and Friends,

Shalom, and Greetings!

The holiday of spring, redemption, matzah, and liberation is now (largely) behind us. It was a pleasure to spend

Passover with so many of you. The Passover Seder was fun, and it was a joy to see so many here at the Temple for the event.

I want to thank all those involved with the Seder. There are too many to do so by name, but you know who you are, and please know that I appreciate your work making our celebration successful and joyous. It would not have happened without you.

At this point in the year we have accomplished the bi-annual direc-

tional shift: moving from being in the period leading up to Passover into the period leading up to the High Holidays. These are the two gravitational wells in our orbit, pulling and balancing us as we move between them. Now that Passover is behind us, Yamim Nora'im (the days of awe) are not that far off!

Which is not to say that there are no

other events coming up before then! On Wednesday, May 1 at 6 PM there will be the Service of Remembrance at B'nai Jacob Synagogue this year, for Yom Ha'Shoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day. The following day, Thursday, May 2, is annual "Unto Every Person There is a Name" at Charleston Town Center Mall, 10 AM – 3:30 PM.


## Friday Shabbat Service followed by the Covered Dish Dinner

What could be nicer? A cup of tea (or coffee), a little cake, a chance to talk about death....

It used to be that one would never speak in polite society about money, sex, religion, or death. It seems that the last of the taboos today is death – but being taboo does not eliminate the need to discuss it.

Death Cafés are a venue where that taboo is left at the door and the topic of all conversations is death. Nothing is right or wrong, no view or opinion is censored, those attending are welcomed and supported, and there is no agenda. It is meant to be a comfortable setting to raise issues and discuss matters around death.

At a Death Cafe people have refreshments and discuss death, the aim being to increase awareness to help people make the most of their (finite) lives. Death Cafés are NOT Therapy and they are NOT counseling. They are facilitated conversations, set and determined by the attendees. Nothing is sold or pitched, and no one is judged.

Practically any topic of conversation relating to death is welcome and permitted: whether it concerns your own feelings about death, an experience related to the death of another, the process of advance-planning, practical or logistical issues around death, or any questions you want to ask. Death Cafés are not affiliated with any religion or product, they have no agenda, and there is no sales pitch or pressure.



We will report to the congregation at the Shabbat service on June 7 about attendance by several members at the recent Consultation on Conscience.
