

From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Temple Israel Congregants, Community members, and Friends,

Shalom, and Greetings!

I am writing you as we prepare for Hanukkah, though this Bulletin probably won't reach you till the end of the holiday. I am looking forward to the pleasure of seeing many of us gathered at the Hanukkah dinner on Dec. 29.

I pray your Festival of Lights will be/is/has been a time of joy, with divine light filling your world and enlightening every corner or your existence. May the spirit of renewal and the energy of reinvigoration permeate and enrich you and all around you.

Let me also wish you a happy and healthy secular new year! Not

a religious holiday, and not officially on the Jewish or Israeli calendars – it is observed in Israel as "Sylvestre" under the heading, why not take advantage of any chance to celebrate? I hope it is a good day, leading into a wonderful year for all of us.

The only religious holiday to note in January is Asarah Be'Tevet, the fast of 10 Tevet, which falls on Jan. 7, commemorating the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar that led to the conquest and destruction of the first Temple in 586 BCE.

Our next holiday will be Tu Be'Shevat in February. We will hold our Four Worlds adult Seder on Sunday, Feb. 9 at 5:30 PM at Temple Israel, and it is open to the entire Jewish community. We are planning it now and it will likely be catered, so RSVPs will be due by Feb. 1, and there may be a cost of \$10 per person. Full information will be sent out shortly in a Reminder Announcements email.

Looking back on December

December was busy, lots happened, and it all seemed to go well. In addition to our weekly Shabbat services and committee meetings, we had a number of special events.

Dec. 4 was the Introduction to Hebrew Level II class: we reviewed Eyn Keloheynu and looked at Adon Olam. The next sessions will be Jan. 22 at 5 PM, then Feb. 12, March 11, April 29, and May 13.



Dec. 4 was the first class with the two rabbis: Rabbi Urecki and I held a conversation on December Dilemmas, and it was a fascinating, wide-ranging discussion, with lots of participation. It was wonderful, and we were so lucky that participants were willing to be open and vulnerable, and share their experiences – it was eyeopening how many different views there were. We will meet again on Jan. 22 at 6:30 PM at the Synagogue.

Dec. 6, we had a Shabbat service with Torah, a pulpit exchange (Rabbi Urecki spoke at the Temple), and a covered dish dinner. This was a lovely evening. We were glad to welcome many friends from the Synagogue, and enjoyed Rabbi Urecki's devar Torah. Dec. 7 was the second half of the pulpit exchange: I spoke at the Synagogue. Some Temple members attended and a very nice kiddush luncheon followed. I think everyone enjoyed the event. Our next pulpit exchange is scheduled for

Feb. 14-15.

Dec. 8 was a Charleston Death Café. There was a small group with a wonderful discussion. We will meet again Jan. 12 at 7 PM, then Feb. 2, March 8, April 5, and May 17.

Rabbi Urecki and I scheduled the first youth group meeting for post-B'nai Mitzvah youth. We planned a mitzvah project, an ethics discussion, a conversation about what comes next, and dinner. We are thinking of monthly meetings. If your youngster

Social Action Corner Continuing dialogue on climate change; Issues of Conscience schedule set through June; Tu Be'Shevat Seder in February

December's Social Action Committee meeting focused on several matters, not the least being a full debriefing of November's Interfaith Climate Change Forum, which was reported on in the December Bulletin.

By many accounts, which included significant and diverse comments from attendees, presenters, and planners, the forum seemed a highly successful, well organized and exciting event that brought credit to and respect for our Temple's community efforts. We agreed that some committee members will continue to have a "seat at the many tables" that will continue the interfaith and organizational dialogues within West Virginia and beyond.

We will also be considering steps our Temple could implement in consultation with other faith communities. This might include minimizing use of plastics, controlling temperatures, ensuring full LED lighting in all outlets, evaluating use of pesticides – in the garden, grounds and housekeeping – and comprehensive recycling programs, as well as other energy saving options previously discussed with the Temple board. SAC members will assist with Tu Be'Shevat, providing traditional fruits, nuts and desserts, in coordination with Rabbi Blair as he leads the Seder on Feb. 9.

Sisterhood Message Sisterhood meeting, brunch and program Jan. 19, to feature local author's new studies on educator Booker T. Washington

The combined Sisterhood board and general membership meeting will be Sunday, Jan. 19 at 10 AM. It will be followed by brunch – cost is \$10 – and a program featuring Del. Larry L. Rowe (D-Kanawha, 36) at approximately 11 o'clock.

In addition to working in his law practice and serving as a West Virginia legislator, Rowe is the author of local histories. His study of the early nineteenth century salt industry and its use of enslaved workers in the Malden area of what is now West Virginia, *Virginia Slavery and King Salt in Booker T. Washington's Boyhood Home,* was published by Old Malden Press in 2019, and will be followed in 2020 by *Booker T. Washington's Boyhood American Dream: The Climb of the Black Middle Class Up from Slavery.*

The program is coordinated by Marsha Albert. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Booker T. Washington in West Virginia

After emancipation Jane [Washington's mother] took her family to West Virginia to join her husband Washington Ferguson, who had escaped from slavery during the war and settled there. Booker began to painstakingly teach himself to read and attended school for the first time.



At school, Booker was asked for a surname

for registration. He took the family name of Washington, after his stepfather. Still later he learned from his mother that she had originally given him the name "Booker Taliaferro" at the time of his birth, but his second name was not used by the master. Upon learning of his original name, Washington immediately readopted it as his own, and became known as Booker Taliaferro Washington for the rest of his life.
