Voter registration has closed, the deadline for Absentee by Mail Application was Oct. 28, and early voting ends Oct. 31. Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 3. Please be sure to cast your ballot, marking it carefully and following the directions fully, so it will be accepted, processed and counted.

I hope you are exercising your privilege and fulfilling the civic obligation to vote. I was both proud and honored to do so; I hope you feel the same and will act accordingly.

I would be remiss if I didn't remind you

that Daylight Saving Time ends at 2 AM on Nov. 1 – we turn the clocks back (fall back, spring ahead!), which allows an extra hour of sleep! :-)

The anniversary of the assassination of Yitzhak Rabin falls on Nov. 4 on the secular calendar.

Sunday, Nov. 8 is the Global Day of Jewish Learning. Started by Aleph, under the direction of Rabbi Adin Steinsaltz, Z"L, it is now part of Limmud North America, and the theme this year is Human Dignity.

On Nov. 9 is the anniversary of Kristallnacht, "the night of broken glass," which has come to be recognized as the formal start of the Holocaust. We will include an observance of it in our Shabbat service on Friday, Nov. 6.

Thanksgiving Day is Thursday, Nov. 26.

Hanukkah begins on the evening of Dec. 10 with the lighting of the first candle. Packs of standard Hanukkah candles are available from the Temple office. Please call Greg to make arrangements to pick some up – we request a donation of \$2 per box. You can pay anytime.

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and social distancing. We know that the Covid-19 coronavirus is no joke.

Online Activities — Our experience with meeting virtually has proven to be quite successful.

No question, we look forward to the day that we will be able to meet again in person, but we have learned that there is much to be gained by continuing to offer online services beyond that time. We are working to acquire, test, and install the necessary equipment to continue and expand our online events. We will be looking into training for congregants on use of the new equipment, to permit us to have services and events in the Sanctuary, and perhaps other locations in the Temple building. This will accommodate those who are not comfortable or able to attend services and events in person, and extend our reach beyond our immediate geographic area, moving forward.

I am very grateful that the Temple board has made it possible to embrace this new technology to meet the needs of our community, and that you, our congregants and community members, have been willing to adopt these new ways of joining together for services. Kol Hakavod to all for your flexibility and the grace you have shown.We will continue to work to refine the process, working to make it incrementally better each week. Meantime, being able to see you on the screen and hear your voices is a wonderful feeling, and helps to fill in the hole left by not seeing you in person.

Services – We will continue weekly Shabbat services as we have been, opening the Zoom session at 5 PM, with services starting at 5:30. Other events will also be offered – see the weekly LINKS email for how to connect.



Prayer Books – We are prepared to lend prayer books to congregants. If you wish to borrow a Siddur for Shabbat, please be in touch with the Rabbi or the Temple office to arrange to pick one up. You don't need to come in the building at all – just let us know you want to borrow prayer book (s), and let us know when you plan to come by. We will place them on the bench at the front of the building (Kanawha Blvd. side); you can just pull up into the circular drive, find the bag on the bench in front with your name on it, and take that bag with your book(s).

If you borrowed a Machzor (prayer book for the High Holy Days) please plan to return it; just let us know when you will be bringing the prayer book(s) by and dropping them off on the bench in front of the Temple entrance so we will know to collect the books. If you would, please put a slip of paper in the book with your name on it so we will know by whom specific books were returned.

As always, we want to serve you in as many ways and as well as it is possible. Please be in touch with me (the rabbi), the office (Greg), or members of the board if you have any needs, suggestions, concerns, or questions.

I close with warm wishes to you, and hopes that you will find many blessings and much to be grateful for at your Thanksgiving observance, however that may look this year.

Social Action Committee Report 4 Issues of Conscience set for this year; next meeting Nov. 30

Focusing on Issues of Conscience priorities for the coming year and the structure of meetings, the Social Action Committee held its first meeting of the new year, via Zoom, on Sept. 21.

It was decided that business meetings will take place every other month, while meetings that focus on Issues of Conscience presentations* will take place in the intervening months.

The four Issues of Conscience presentation priorities this year, carried over from the Temple member SAC event of last year, are: Homelessness, Racism, Environmental Justice, and Poverty as it Relates to Mental Health and Mental Healthcare.

Marsha Albert volunteered to organize the Oct. 26 presentation, its focus on homelessness in the Charleston area. The

Committee decided to hold another Temple member event in June (date and time TBA) to share the work of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism and of the Temple Israel Social Action Committee, as well as to learn the priorities of Temple members regarding Issues of Conscience for next year.

The Committee plans to purchase three copies of the 2019 non-fiction work *How to Be an Anti-Racist* by Ibram X. Kendi, a discussion of concepts of racism and the author's proposals for anti-racist individual actions and systemic changes. The copies will be shared among Committee members, then donated to the Temple library.

Meetings for the coming year (*asterisk denotes Issues of Conscience presentation meetings) will take place on Nov. 30, Dec. 28*, Jan. 25, Feb. 22*, March 29, April 26* and May 24. Please note that

the meeting times have been changed to 6:30 - 7:45 PM. We welcome all Temple members to attend.
