As I write this it is mid-August and we are about to enter into the High Holiday season. It falls 'early' this year, starting with Rosh Hashanah evening on Monday, Sept. 6, beginning just as the Labor Day weekend is ending.

Opening of the Building for Worship

The board decided that we will be having both online and in-person attendance for services starting with Rosh Hashanah evening. For safety, only those who are fully vaccinated may come into the building for services, and everyone worshipping in-person must wear masks while in the building. The opening is only for worship services at this time: meetings and social gatherings are not yet permitted, and no food or beverage will be served. Of course, the Security Committee and the board will continue to monitor the situation, and when possible, we look forward to opening more fully.

I am looking forward to seeing some of you in person soon. Though we will be masked, it will be a delight to be able to have others in the beautiful sanctuary, joining in our worship services, as we are accustomed to do in past. It has been lonely and strange to lead in an empty room; I miss having others there with me to form our kahal to pray. Though I have valued the online option, and the sense of community that it offered, it did not give me a sense of presence and connection as I led services (I find that it is difficult to watch the screen while praying, so I do not see or sense anyone other than our musical team – David Stern and Bob Morris – and technical wizards – Rich Katz and David Shapiro – who are in the room), which is why I will welcome so heartily the physical presence of those who are in the room.

Holiday and Shabbat worship services

From "Covid-19 Rules and Procedures for Reopening for Worship," which sets out the rules and procedures for those who choose to attend services in-person, and were adopted by the Temple Israel board of trustees Aug. 10, 2021: By way of overview, those Rules and Procedures provide that

"those congregants worshipping in-person in the Temple shall be fully vaccinated and masks shall be worn when in the Temple building. There will be no limit on the number of persons permitted to worship in the Sanctuary and no reservations are required. There will be no social distancing required, although worshippers may choose to social distance to the extent space permits. Our annual Rosh Hashanah Reception has been canceled since no food will be served in the Sanctuary or social hall to keep our congregants safe. If announced in advance, there may be an opportunity for those attending in-person to gather before or after the service on the Temple grounds or in the social hall and foyer. Please remember that our goals are to meet the needs of our congregants who want in-person worship and to keep everyone as safe as possible."

Beginning with the Rosh Hashanah Morning service on Sept. 6, services may be attended in-person or online.

Covid-19 Concerns

By the time you read this, you should have received the letter and the "COVID-19 Rules and Procedures for Reopening for Worship" mailed out by Temple president Francine Thalheimer, concerning the Temple board's adoption of those Rules, which govern the reopening of the building to in-person service attendance. Although summarized in that letter and in this article, you are urged to read the Rules carefully if you want to attend services in-person.

This is a carefully considered approach. It allows for in-person worship by those who are vaccinated and who wish to do so, while also recognizing that not everyone will make this choice which is the reason for the permanent installation of the audio-video equipment to provide high quality streaming access to services. It is the intention of the Temple board to continue this access so that anyone who is unable or chooses not to attend in-person for any reason can still participate in the services. We have greatly enjoyed having people from far and near joining us online, and we want to continue to make that possible.

The Rules recently adopted amend the prior policy, but only in regard to worship services. All other events, gatherings, classes, and programs are still governed by the policy adopted previously, which directs that we monitor conditions for the triggers that either open or limit access, depending on the situation at the time. When those triggers are tripped, we will open the building for additional uses, so long as the situation does not worsen and indicate a further closure. We continue to be cautious, erring on the side of the safety and well-being of all, while moving toward more access as it is deemed advisable. But this also allows us to remain flexible as conditions improve, worsen, or change. Please know that the board and congregational leaders are working to-

ward a return to our accustomed activities, to the maximum degree possible, as it is deemed safe and prudent.

Services: Opening of The Zoom Session, Entry to the Building

There will be no in-person option for services through Sept. 5. Starting with the eve of Rosh Hashanah on Sept. 6, in-person attendance at worship services will be permitted for those who meet the criteria established in the Rules. They may enter the building no more than 15 minutes prior to a scheduled service start time; the doors will be unlocked at that time, and locked again fifteen minutes after the scheduled start time. After that point, please press the Intercom button and wait for a response.

The online Zoom session of services will continue to be opened for social time 30 minutes prior to the beginning of the service.

For a regular Shabbat or special evening service taking place after Sept. 5, the online Zoom session will open at 5 PM, entry to the building will begin at 5:15, and the service will commence at 5:30.

For the High Holy Days, the evening services are scheduled for 8 PM; entry to the building will begin at 7:45, and the online Zoom session will open at 7:30.

Please see elsewhere in the bulletin for the times of other than evening services for the holidays, and adjust the times, accordingly.

Until the triggers in the policy indicate otherwise, all other events, programs, classes, and meetings will be online (not inperson in the building); any events at other locations may have different policies applied (such as meetings of the Leora May Book Club or Sisterhood). For information on how to access online events, please see the weekly LINKS Email for how to connect via Zoom.
