Rabbi's Message

Shalom & greetings!

I am writing this with the warming glow of the last lights of Hanukkah and the music of Nefesh Mountain in my thoughts. Hanukkah was a lovely holiday, and though it felt somewhat constrained, at the same time the community celebration we had was joyous: it was good to see so many people in person, from both the Temple and the Synagogue. It was a celebration that brought in light and lifted my heart, and I hope those who attended felt the same. Those who did not attend - I certainly understand that it was not comfortable or safe for everyone, but I also want to tell you that you were truly missed, and we are looking forward to a time when we will see you face to face soon, we hope, IY"H.

The Jewish community came together again for the Nefesh Mountain concert – a Hanukkah-themed songfest sponsored by the Federated Jewish Charities of Charleston, B'nai Jacob Synagogue, and Temple Israel. We were able to accommodate many people because the decision was not only to permit some limited attendance in person, but to provide online access via Zoom. In that way, we were able to offer the music of this amazing group to the widest possible audience throughout the community.

The board determined last October that the Temple will be open for in-person worship services, with attendees required to be fully vaccinated and to wear a mask at all times in the building. 
Notes and announcements

A calendar item in December was the Ta'anit Asarah B'Tevet (the fast of the 10th of Tevet), which commemorates the events in the year 425 BCE and after, when the armies of the Babylonian emperor Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem. Thirty months later-on 9 Tammuz—the city walls were breached, and on 9 Av of that year the Holy Temple was destroyed. The Jewish people were exiled to Babylonia for 70 years. The 10th of Tevet is observed as a day of fasting, mourning and repentance. The tradition is to refrain from food and drink from daybreak to nightfall, and to add Selichot (penitential prayers) and other supplements to the prayers. The fast ends at nightfall, or as soon as you see three medium-sized stars.
