Aside from weather, the big news is that the Temple board of trustees voted at its March meeting to re-open the Temple for services and related activities. The status is that all who enter should be fully vaccinated, respect the comfort level and wishes of other people with regard to social distancing, and make their own choice with regard to masks (masks are encouraged, but not required). The building re-opened March 18 for in-person services, as well as for Onegs, and we are planning to hold the Congregational Passover Seder on April 15.

Work continues to acquire the necessary equipment to enable us to Zoom from other areas. We anticipate this will be accomplished soon, but it has been delayed due to circumstances. Stay

We will hold a Torah Study on April 2.

- Shabbat Hagadol (The Great Shabbat) and Parashah Metzorah fall on April 9, the Shabbat prior to the start of Passover.
- The fast of the first born (Ta'anit Bechorot) is on Friday, April 15, and the first Passover Seder is the evening of Friday April 15. Passover is April 16-22 (or the 23rd if you observe eight days).
- In the Christian world, Palm Sunday is April 10, April 15 is Good Friday, and Easter Sunday is April 17.
- The counting of the Omer begins the evening of April 16, with the first day of the Omer on April 17, and continuing for 49 days till Shavuot.
- The deadline for filing income tax returns is April 18.
- Yom HaShoah is the evening of April 27 through sundown April 28. Watch the Reminder Links Emails for events info.
- Faith Climate Action week is April 22 to May 1.
- Rosh Chodesh (the new moon) for Iyar is on the evening of April 30 and the days of May 1 till sundown May 2.
- Yom HaZikaron (Israeli Memorial Day) is May 4.
- Yom Ha'Atzma'ut (Israeli Independence Day) is May 5. We will acknowledge it in the Shabbat service on May 6.

We will hold a Torah study on May 7.

Sisterhood Message Astonishing heroism to marvel at and good reasons to smile

Dear member of Temple Israel Sisterhood,

Over the past 18 to 22 months many of the articles that I've shared with you have related to the many people who exhibited unbelievable heroism in conquering the death sentence from the Nazis. Among the lessons that we have learned is the promise of NEVER AGAIN!

It is happening again but it's happening differently and in Ukraine with an unprovoked war being waged on the Ukrainians and their entire country. The difference according to what I am paying close attention to with the newscasts, newspaper, internet, etc. is that the Ukrainians are fighting back. While we don't know that they will prevail and win they are staging a courageous effort that is unlike anything that we have seen in modern times.

Back in the 1930s and early 1940s there was no opportunity to fight back. Then it was strictly a matter of hiding until you got caught, and then in so many cases it was a guarantee of death. I feel proud to be watching while also feeling great anguish and sorrow for the thousands of families that have been separated and children that have been put at great risk. I know each of you join me in the wish that the Ukrainians will prevail and President Zelensky will remain strong, hoping one of these days that I awaken to the news that peace talks are underway.

As you read this bulletin in April 2022, from my personal perspective it will be the next to the last message that I will share with you as president of Sisterhood. I hope that next month, in May, I will be the bearer of better news, while I know absolutely that each one of you join me in that wish.

On a lighter side with lots of happiness attached, Temple Israel is reopening and I am looking forward to being able to attend services in the Sanctuary and not on Zoom. As we return to Temple Israel in general there is a brand-new kitchen, and as someone who loves to cook and write recipes and help people be as healthy as possible, I am very excited about all those new tools that will be at our disposal.

We are going to see some new members coming from some areas in West Virginia due to changing lifestyles as some people have had to give up their places of worship, both in Parkersburg and Bluefield, and some of those people are finding their way to Temple Israel.

We, here in Charleston, West Virginia, have reasons to smile and be excited for some good things that are happening in a good and grand way. Please continue to watch everything that is available about the unprovoked war in Ukraine and let us pray for the millions of people that have a been forced to become refugees while being grateful that so many countries in Eastern Europe have been able to open their borders and welcome them in to their country.
