# Rabbi's Message

Shalom & greetings!

Hard to believe summer is over, and it is already time to write the September bulletin article! Time really does fly.

At this point (late-August through late -September) we are in the month of Elul, which ends leading into Rosh Chodesh (the new moon marking the new month) for the month of Tishrei, the beginning of the New Year – and that means we are already looking at the High Holidays! Rosh Hashanah begins on the evening of Sept. 25, and continues on the 26th. Yom Kippur begins on the evening of Oct. 4, and continues through the end of the day on the 5th. As if that wasn't enough, Sukkot begins the evening of Oct. 9, and runs through Oct. 17, or the 18th for the eightday diehards.

Then we have a little time to breathe: our next holiday isn't till the evening of Dec. 18, continuing through sundown on Dec. 26 – and of course, that is Hanukkah. So, we have our "winter" pattern – an intense holiday period, followed by a quiet stretch, then another, longer holiday.

Yom Kippur is Tuesday evening Oct. 4 at 7:30 PM (*Kol Nidrei*) and Wednesday

We will enjoy the musical rendering of the *Kol Nidrei* Tuesday evening, by Sandra Gross on the viola, with Bob Morris singing the words, and piano accompaniment by our music director, David Stern.

Yom Kippur services are Morning (10:30 AM), Afternoon (12:30 PM), Memorial (5:15 PM), and Concluding (at approximately 6 PM, beginning shortly after the conclusion of the Memorial service). All of these services will be available both in-person and online.

There will also be a Torah Study at 3 PM, but that will be available online only.

Information on any refreshments, such as a Rosh Hashanah reception or a Yom Kippur break-the-fast, will be forthcoming separately.

I am available Sunday through Thursday much of the day, and on Friday generally until 3 PM. I am in the building for at least part of most days and I read email and texts quite regularly (Shabbat and holidays excepted, when I try to avoid using devices that require me to type). In an emergency, please call my cell, and if you leave a message, please express the urgency of the call and the nature of the need in the message.

Please note that, as you are reading this, I am taking a block of time off, late August to early September, and plan to be out of town during that period. I should be reachable by phone or email, but my schedule will be unpredictable: this is the period when my wife, Karen will need assistance following a surgery and during her recovery, and she will have to put up with me trying to serve as caregiver, nurse, and cook (I think it appropriate to extend sympathy to her on this account!). I informed the Board about this some time ago; many have offered to step in as needed, and Rabbi Urecki has agreed to serve as my

rabbinic backup during this period in case of any emergencies. I am especially grateful to the members of the Ritual Committee who have volunteered to cover services in my absence – please be kind to them!
