

Rabbi's Message

Shalom & greetings!

As I write this, we have just completed our service observing Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah, the tail end of Sukkot (though the holiday actually runs through Monday night Oct. 17, or Oct. 18 for those observing a full 8 days). It has been almost a month of holidays and special events, in addition to our usual activities and observances. I felt really good about our High Holidays, and found it to be inspiring, uplifting and a source of joy to spend them with you – I sincerely hope you felt the same way. At the same time, I have to admit that I am a bit drained by all the activity and events - and I will be looking to 're-charge my batteries' in the next several weeks so I can dive back in full-tilt for the rest of this year. I am grateful that there are no major holidays for a bit – until we arrive at Hanukkah, actually – and I will be looking forward to observing it with you. (Please note that a communal Hanukkah dinner is being planned, and mark Dec. 19 as the likely evening.)

The High Holy Days (Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur) seemed lovely, but I am not in a position to see them from the perspective of a congregant, so I would very much appreciate your constructive feedback and comments about how we could make them better. If you prefer, you are welcome to give your thoughts to

Ronni Spudich or other members of the Ritual Committee instead. The Committee will soon meet to evaluate the Holidays and plan ahead for next year.

I am aware of technical problems at some of the services and want to reassure you that we are working to resolve them. There are many interlocking pieces and parts, including a variety of software, hardware, equipment, installation, and operator training components, some of which are beyond our control (the internet, software updates, equipment failures, and so on). Please understand that everyone working on the streaming of services is doing their best. We will make it work, though there will probably be hiccoughs along the way. We all feel frustrated when it does not work perfectly, and rush to try to make it right, but it's most likely not going to be perfect 100% of the time. We hope you can be patient. I think all of us care about delivering the best possible experience, aiming as high as humanly possible. When things do go wrong, we heave-to and try to address it ASAP.

Survey Results

Back in September, I asked for input on which calendar events you wanted to see retained, and how often and when you wanted them to be held. Thanks to all who responded with their preferences. All have been taken into account, and based on the majority of comments and suggestions, I've come up with a working calendar for this

others, and are listed elsewhere):

A Bissell Torah. Online, weekly on most Thursdays, at 4:15 PM (but canceled in any given week when there's a holiday or other events that conflict). Please note the change in time.

Charleston Death Café. Online, monthly on the last Sunday (this would be the fourth Sunday, or the fifth Sunday when there are five Sundays in a month) at 7 PM. Please note the change in time and the date.

Havdalah. These services will be inperson and online, on selected Saturdays at 7 PM, held three times during the year: Dec. 10, Feb. 25 & May 6.

Jewish Literature. Online, every third week on Sundays at 4:15 PM, starting Nov. 6. Please note the date and time changes.

Torah Study. Online (until an adequate system for hybrid participation can be worked out for events held outside the Sanctuary). It will be held monthly on the first Sunday at 10:30 AM.

Two Charleston Rabbis. Online, monthly, on the first Wednesday at 6:15 PM. (It will be canceled or rescheduled in any given week when holidays or other events conflict). Please note the change in time.

Zoom Check-ins. This is a significant revision, including its being renamed Zoom Leadership Check-ins. This will be online, monthly on the second Monday of the month at 10 AM, with one or more members of the Temple board in attendance. History: the check-in was established to keep the congregation and community in contact during the Pandemic, particularly while we couldn't meet in person, none of which is still the case. Over time, these sessions became opportunities for committees to share information about what was happening or planned in the congregation and community. Some participants specifically wanted to include congregational officers, to hear news and to share concerns. If additional meetings to conduct congregational or committee business are needed, or there is a desire to have a different type of meeting for socialization, those can be scheduled independent of the **Zoom Leadership Check-in**, but not necessarily as ongoing events.

B'nai Jacob-based Classes

Classes held with B'nai Jacob Congregation (using Rabbi Urecki's Zoom account; announced by Rabbi Urecki with links in his newsletter). I will be participating in some of these classes, and invite you to join with me.

Torah Class. Online and in-person, weekly on Tuesdays at 10 AM, starting Nov. 1.

Talmud Class. Online and in-person, weekly on Thursdays at 10 AM starting Nov. 3.

Adult Hebrew Class. Online and in-person, or via recordings, 10 AM. It started Oct. 24. Email nancy@bnaijacob.com for information or to register. (I know little about this class, but am listing it to inform anyone interested.)

Thoughts, Blessings, & Salutations

The High Holy days bring home the theme of judgement and our fate - we hear it in the Unetaneh Tokef prayer, asking who shall live and who die; we speak it in the confessional prayers we recite listing the catalog of sins we may have committed or allowed to occur in our community; it is driven home in the metaphor that is included in our liturgy concerning the book of judgement, in which G-d inscribes our fate based on what we have done in the past year, and how we have approached the process of Teshuvah (repentance and return) over the holiday season. The liturgy speaks of Yom Kippur as the day on which G-d closes that book, having entered the appropriate judgement for each living being, with Ne'ilah, the Concluding service of Yom Kippur described as our last opportunity to make amends.

There is, however, another tradition that speaks to G-d as merciful, compassionate, and gracious, and in this light Yom Kippur is not the last moment for Teshuvah. Seeing G-d as a loving and forgiving father figure, this tradition teaches that even after Yom Kippur ends, and the book is closed, with our fate written in it, G-d offers us yet a little more leeway. Up until the conclusion of Simchat Torah, it tells us, we can still repent and return, we can still make amends, we can still seek to effect a tikkun and turn to the correct path, and up to that time G-d is still willing to re-open that book and amend the judgement in light of our sincere Teshuvah. It is only after Simchat Torah that the book of life is finally sealed, according to this tradition.

This additional opportunity to effect change and reconnect with G-d and the person we are meant to be is, at least in my thoughts, an additional reason that the period of Sukkot and Simchat Torah is identified as "zman simchateinu" - the time of our rejoicing. Not only do we celebrate the bounty of creation and G-d's gifts, we also rejoice that we have been granted additional time to complete the necessary work and take the steps to be reunited with G-d, re-oriented to the correct path, and renewed in our determination to live in accordance with the guidelines and lessons that we have been gifted in the Torah.

Truly, all of this is ample reason to rejoice. May this period of zman simchateinu be, for all of us, not only the time, but more - our lived experience and our reality at this moment and throughout 5783.

As before, I wish you all possible blessings, and a Shanah Tovah Umetukah Tichateimu – may you be sealed for a good and sweet new year.
