Calendar News

Rosh Chodesh Shevat (the new month of Shevat) begins Jan. 23.

We enter the series of special Shabbatot, named by the special Haftarah read on that day; the first one is Shabbat Shirah, the sabbath of song, on which we read the Song by the Sea (Shirat Hayam) from Parashah Beshalach, which is attributed to Moses describing the miracles at the Reed Sea- Feb. 3-4 this year. Temple security is everyone's concern—learning best practices

Dear Members of the Temple Israel Commu- opportunities in the next few weeks. nity:

At the January board of trustees meeting, the Co-Chairs of the Security Committee, David Shapiro and David McAfee, addressed security concerns. With the rise in hate and anti-Semitism, the board felt a conversation regarding Temple safety was in order. Our discussion focused on security cameras inside and outside our Temple. The Security Committee will follow up with more information about cameras and grant

The Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) has encouraged Reform congregations to review security practices. Recently, the URJ hosted "The Power of Hello" webinar with Secure Community Network (SCN), which is the official safety and security organization of the Jewish community in North America. Used effectively, the right words can be a powerful tool when security issues arise. Simply saying "Hello" can prompt a casual conversation with a person, providing an

opportunity for Temple clergy, staff, and members, to observe and establish a connection. It also enables individuals to observe and evaluate suspicious behaviors, empowering them to lower risks and obtain help when necessary.

The SCN also presented "Surviving Hostage Situations" in January. The webinar presented practical steps to take at the onset, duration, and resolution of a hostage situation. Panelists included a

Tu B'Shevat, the 15th day of the month of Shevat, known as the New Year for the Trees, our holiday marking creation and the environment, and fulfilling the mitzvah to allow a tree to develop a strong and healthy root system before commercially harvesting produce from it, is on Feb. 6 (we will observe it in the Shabbat service Feb. 3, along with Refugee Shabbat and Shabbat Shirah).

On Feb. 17, we will hold another special Shabbat: Shabbat Shekalim, and the Torah reading is from Parashah Mishpatim. In addition, this is Reproductive Rights Shabbat, including special readings and a guest to deliver the dvar Torah, Alannah Boyle of NCJW.

Rosh Chodesh (the start of the new month) for Adar is Feb. 21 & 22.

The 7th of Adar, the day set aside to honor Chevrah Kadisha members, is on Feb. 28. This date is selected because it is understood to be the day on which Moses died, and G-d served as the Chevrah Kadisha for him, so the human members of the Chevrah Kadisha are given the day "off."

The Fast of Esther is on March 6 – this is an observance to remember the fast that Esther asked all the Jews to undertake with her as she prepared to go before the king without being summoned.

Then, the holiday of Purim itself falls on March 7 (and we will observe it in the Shabbat service March 3). This is also Shabbat Zachor, the sabbath of remembrance, when we recall the evil that was intended by Amalek, connected by the Rabbis midrashically with Haman.

The following week is Shabbat Parah – the sabbath of the red heifer, on March 10 -11; we read from Parashah Ki Tisa (Exodus 30:11-34:35; Numbers 19:1-22).

On March 17-18 we observe Shabbat Hachodesh, marking the beginning of the month in which Passover will fall. The Parashah read is the combined portion of Vayakhel-Pekudei.

Rosh Chodesh Nisan is March 23.

Parashah Vayikra is read March 24-25.

Shabbat Hagadol, the Great Sabbath, the one immediately prior to the start of the festival of Passover, falls on March 31 - April 1. The Parashah read is Tzav.

Finally, on April 5 is Ta'anit Bechorot, the fast of the first born. This lasts until sundown, when we begin the festival of Passover, and hold the first Seder. (This is when our Temple Israel congregational Seder will be held, so please make note of it.) Passover runs from the first day on April 6 through the 7th day of the holiday on April 13 (extending to the 14th for those who follow the custom of eight days).

We begin to count the Omer starting the evening of April 6 or day of the 7th, marking off 49 days, which brings us up to Shavuot.

As you can see, a lot will be going on – and it continues following Passover!

This means that our calendar is busy and full. I know that I, your officers and board members, and committee members

are all trying to best serve our congregation and community, and to offer meaningful, inviting, and engaging services, programs, classes and activities.

You are why we're here

But all is for naught, without you. You are the reason we work so hard and do what we do.

I know that not every event is of interest to all — and we may not be hitting the right thing(s) to appeal to you — so won't you please let us know what you want? This is not the first time I have had this experience, but it is still extraordinarily difficult and heartbreaking, yet I know I feel nothing like what the family must be experiencing. My heartfelt wishes for them to be comforted from heaven – may we all offer them our support, love, and tender care. They chose a private interment so there is no ceremony to announce.

Thoughts, Blessings, and Salutations

As I have mentioned, there was a tragic loss of an infant in our community recently. We are heartbroken, and send love and care to those in mourning. We will do what we are able for them — knowing it can only soothe the pain they feel, not remove it, but it is all we have the power to do.

I am not writing to bemoan that we cannot "fix" it for them (though that is certainly true): instead, what I want to address is that this devastating event highlighted something that is not often acknowledged, and should be.

In the face of the unthinkable, our community and congregation pulled together and did what was necessary to offer all the comfort and support possible to the affected family. From the actions of the Chevrah Kadisha in our community, to the Helen F. Thalheimer Care Committee of Temple Israel Sisterhood, to the Cemetery Committee, to everyone who reached out, this was a response from the heart, with compassion and care, at the time it was needed.

What I want to point out is that this is a source of hope, a sign that we are doing the right thing, Jewishly; offering Kavod (honor) to the deceased, and Nechamah (comfort) to the bereaved. These are the core of the some of the highest levels of the mitzvot (commanded actions, good deeds) that we have as our guideline for living a good, meaningful, and godly life.

I am writing to say "thank you" cvbnm to all who stepped up, in whatever way, for this family - and by extension did so on behalf of all of us who live and work in this community, as well as for all of us because every one of us will be in a somewhat similar position of having suffered a devastating loss at some time in our lives. It is an honor to live and work among people who fulfill these core mitzvot at critical moments for those in circumstances that call for it. In response. I want to extend a sincere Kol Hakavod every honor to the members of our congregation and community. May we all be blessed with the fruits of our efforts to support and sustain those among us who need it, and may those efforts help us to continue to form and live as a kehillah kadoshah – a holy community.



Temple Israel Cemetery Policy

Charleston, West Virginia

Amended and Restated January 10, 2023

This compilation of Cemetery policy is based on rules promulgated by the Board of Trustees of Temple Israel over the past quarter-century as well as by tradition and experience. The overarching theme is: "Maintain the Jewish character of the Cemetery."

Rules

- 1. Artificial or cut flowers in containers are permitted.
- 2. Non-Jewish religious symbols are not to be displayed.
- 3. The only religious ceremonies to be conducted at the Cemetery are Jewish ones.
- 4. Concrete or metal vaults are not required.
- 5. A marker is required to identify the deceased buried in the lot. The marker may be placed up to a year later.
- 6. The head of the deceased is ordinarily pointed to the west.
- 7. Cremated remains may be buried at the Cemetery.
 - a. Cremated remains must be buried in a container that is biodegradable.
 - b. One set of cremated remains shall be buried in either the 'upper' or 'lower' half of the lot, and the location will be annotated on the cemetery plat.
 - c. A second set of cremated remains may be buried in the 'upper' or 'lower' half of the lot, whichever was not used for the first set of cremated remains. In this case, there must be an indication of who is buried in each half of the lot on the marker or markers placed on the lot.
 - d. No more than two sets of cremated remains may be buried in any lot.
- 8. Subject to prior approval of the Warden or the Cemetery Committee, respectful monuments and head and foot stones are generally acceptable.
- 9. Planting of plants or trees require prior permission of the Warden or Cemetery Committee.
- 10. Current cost per lot of \$700 (\$800 for nonmembers) includes Perpetual Care.
- 11. Unoccupied lots will not be expropriated by the Temple without permission of the family that owns them.

Eligibility for Burial

- A. All Temple members
- B. Immediate family of Temple members, including spouse and children, even if they are not Jewish.
- C. The local Jewish community

Perpetual Care Services

- I. Maintenance of lawn, plantings and vegetation
- II. Repair of damage caused by acts of nature or vandalism
- III. In season, water spigots are available
- IV. Periodic clearing, removal and disposal of materials placed at gravesites

survivor of the hostage incident at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas and security professionals with backgrounds in crisis negotiations.

I appreciate the commitment of our Security Committee in addressing the security needs of our congregation. It is important for our congregation to be proactive and prepared. Our doors are monitored before services and Temple events and are then locked after 30 minutes. If you arrive after the doors are locked, just ring the doorbell and someone will open the door.
