Rabbi's Message

Shalom & greetings!

Though I am writing this in mid-August, by the time you are reading it, summer has effectively come and gone, and we are approaching the High Holy Days and the new year! The last month of the current year, Elul, began Aug. 17 (Rosh Chodesh was Aug. 17-18), and Rosh Hashanah (the first day of the first month of the new year, Tishrei), begins on the evening of Sept. 15. (More on the High Holidays below.)

Calendar news

Recent Highlights. The summer was quieter, but we continued many activities. Shabbat services were held weekly, and we held Sisterhood schmoozes and Leora May Book Club meetings as scheduled, and Jewish Literature, by popular demand, continued through the summer, albeit at a slightly reduced pace. Other courses and classes went on summer break after June, so A Bissell Torah, Two Charleston Rabbis, Torah Study, and the Charleston Death Café all paused.

A major event of note: the annual Congregational meeting took place June 14. Mazal tov to those elected, and much

appreciation to those who completed their time serving on the Temple board.

In July, I taught for the WVU Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) – a three-session discussion around Jewish Ethics. It was a fun discussion each week. I will teach another three-session course in October, focusing on contemporary poetry of liturgy.

We noted Tisha B'Av (the Ninth of Av, a Fast day commemorating the destruction of both the first and second Temples) and Shabbat Nachamu (the Sabbath of Consolation) on July 28-29 (the Sabbath immediately following Tisha B'Av, on which we read the first of seven Haftarat of consolation). Tu B'Av, the Jewish holiday of love (like Valentine's Day in the secular calendar) was Aug. 2. The "Indoor Picnic" covered dish dinner was held following the Shabbat service on Aug. 4, and I think everyone who attended had a great time.

The service on August 11th was lay-led, and went very well. Mazal tov to Alan Fleischmann for leading, and to Gayle Twigger-Shaw, Millie Snyder, and Fran Thalheimer who all participated in the service.

Looking Ahead. September is a very full month due to the High Holidays. Plans are underway for a Rosh Hashanah reception

on Friday, Sept. 15, and a Break-the-Fast following the concluding service on Yom Kippur, Monday, Sept. 25.

Friday, Sept. 22 will be Shabbat Shuvah. Our observance of Sukkot will be at the Friday, Sept. 29 Shabbat service. The Shabbat service on Friday, Oct. 6 is when we will observe Simchat Torah observance, which will complete High Holiday events and services.

The High Holy Days, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah

The High Holy Days begin in mid-September, and the holidays continue through Sukkot and Simchat Torah into early October.

Rosh Hashanah will be on Friday evening and Saturday morning, Sept. 15-16. We will include a virtual Tashlikh service in the morning service on Saturday – we will not be going to the river, so that those who are at home may also participate in the service.

Shabbat Shuvah will be Friday, Sept. 22 at 5:30 PM. Shabbat services, except for Sept. 15, which coincides with Rosh Hashanah, will continue at 5:30 PM every Friday through the period, and beyond.

Yom Kippur is Sunday evening Sept. 24 at 7:30 PM (Kol Nidrei), with services on Monday, Sept. 25 starting at 10:30 AM, continuing into the early evening. There will also be a Torah Study at 3:30 PM on Yom Kippur afternoon, but that will be available online only.

We will enjoy the musical rendering of the Kol Nidrei Sunday evening, by our musical guest Yaniv Gutman on the violin, with our soloist Bob Morris singing the words, and with piano accompaniment by our music director, David Stern.

Yom Kippur services are Morning (10:30 AM), Afternoon (12:30 PM), Memorial (5:00 PM), and Concluding (at approximately 6 PM, beginning shortly after the conclusion of the Memorial service). All these services will be available both in-person and online, on Zoom and Facebook.

Sukkot will be observed at the Shabbat service (5:30 PM) on Friday, Sept. 29.

There will be a reception following the Rosh Hashanah Eve service and a Break-the-Fast immediately following the Yom Kippur concluding service. On Oct. 6, there will be a covered dish dinner following the Shabbat service where we will be celebrating Simchat Torah.

At the Cemetery

Temple establishes *Genizah* for burial of sacred texts; road repairs complete; new water spigots

The summer months have been used to complete some much-needed work at the Temple Cemetery.

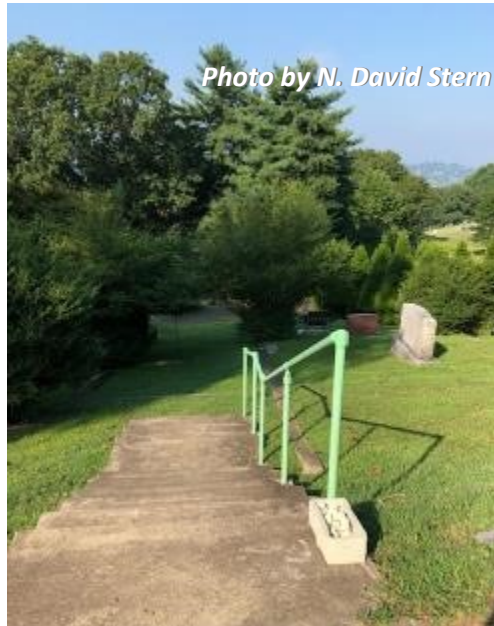

A large tree with roots that were causing road problems has been removed. The paving of the lower road completes the road project. All roads are now up to par.

Sears Monument cleaned 72 stones and made necessary repairs where needed. Three rusted water spigots were replaced.

Old prayer books and other books selected by Rabbi Blair were buried in a newly created *Genizah* from two plots. A marker has been ordered.

Regular lawn mowing and tree trimming has been done on schedule.

Front door passenger drop-off and accessible parking in the semi-circular driveway



The semi-circular driveway at the Temple's front entrance on Kanawha Blvd. can be used as a passenger drop-off area and as accessible parking for people with disabilities.

If you need to park in front of the building, please pull as close to the edge of the driveway as possible. Other cars need to drop off passengers and get past you to park elsewhere.

When parking in the semi-circle, **please don't block the ramp** that leads to the front doors.

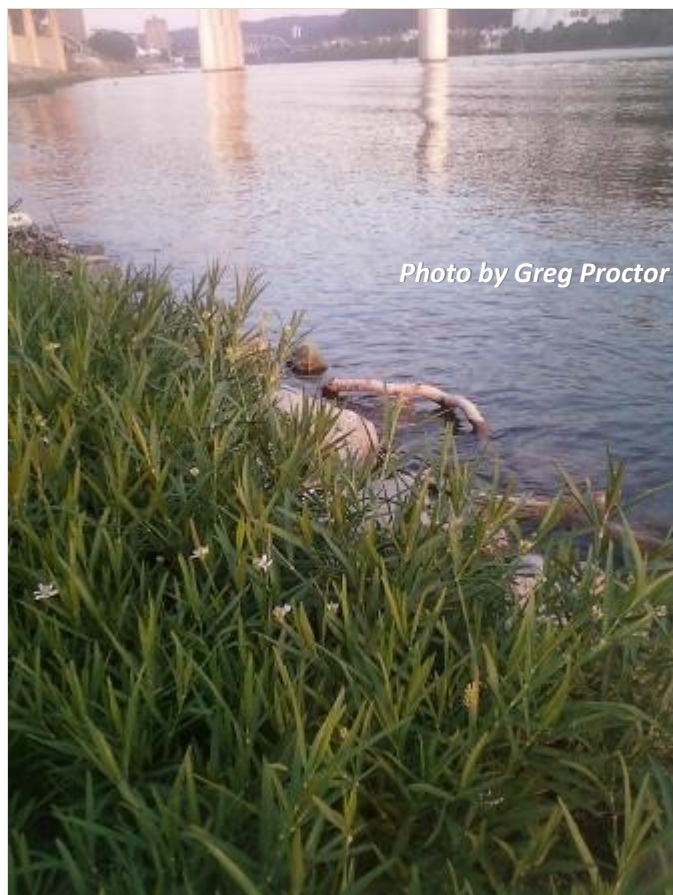
