Rabbi's Message

Shalom & greetings!

As I write this in mid-September, we are just about to enter the Yamim Nora'im, the days of Awe.

I am hopeful that we will offer our congregation and community meaningful and uplifting services, music, and rituals; warm and friendly fellowship; and opportunities to share delicious treats. I want to remind you that many people work hard to make this happen. Please take a moment and consider expressing your appreciation for everyone engaged in making this time special. It very much takes a village to sustain a vibrant Kehilah Kadosha (holy community), especially at this very busy season, and I am extraordinarily thankful that we have people in our congregation who take this on – my deepest appreciation to them all.

I am writing during the month of Elul, the month leading up to the High Holidays. This is intended to be a time of introspection and self-evaluation, with the goal of striving to "do better" in the coming year, and trying to rectify those things we did that do not measure up in the past year. I know that I, as have all of us, "missed the mark" in the past year, and want to do better in future. In that light, if you wish to speak to me and tell me how I fell short in our interactions, or to unburden yourself of negative emotions that are associated with my failings, please let me know so that I can make an opportunity for us to speak, privately and candidly – either during the holiday season, or at any time after. In those instances in which I am aware of my failings, I want to acknowledge them, offer

sincere and heartfelt apologies, and humbly request your forgiveness, with full intention and desire to do better in future. I specifically ask that if I have offended or injured you in any way in past, that you consider granting the gift of forgiveness to me – not because you owe it to me, but as a measure of your gracious nature and for your own well-being. At the same time, I forgive anything done to me by others.



I have been invited to speak at the Oct. 15 service of the Davis Memorial Presbyterian Church in Gassaway by Pastor James Riggs, on the topic of Passover in the Tanach and as it is currently observed.

Also on Oct. 15, we will hold another Jewish Literature session, at 4 PM. This will now be a regular monthly event, meeting on the third Sunday of each month (unless that is a holiday) 4-5 PM (a slightly modified time from prior meetings).

The United States Attorneys for the Southern and Northern Districts of West Virginia will be partnering with the American Jewish Committee to provide a virtual briefing/training regarding antisemitism awareness on Oct. 17 at 1-3 pm. We are co-sponsoring the local event with B'nai Jacob Congregation, with inperson attendance at the Synagogue. With the continuing rise of antisemitic incidents, this is timely and worthy of your attention.

The next Leora May Book Club meeting is scheduled for Oct. 18, time and location TBA.

Rabbi Urecki and I plan to restart both the Torah and Talmud classes soon after the conclusion of our holiday season, and I urge you to join him (and me) in those sessions. The conversation is interesting, enlightening, and just plain fun Similarly, once the holiday season concludes, Rabbi Urecki and I will set a schedule for Two Charleston Rabbi Discussions. I will let you know when that is on the calendar.

Thoughts, Blessings, and Salutations

The traditional greeting that we exchange changes a bit after Rosh Hashanah, and we use it all the way through Simchat Torah (giving us a little extra time to make the changes in our behavior that we wish to undertake for the new year. It is:

L'shanah tovah umetukah teichateimu May you be sealed for a good and sweet year!

I offer this greeting, and all the hopes it expresses, to you and your loved ones. My wish is that the holiday season will continue to be filled with light, laughter, love, joy, happiness, health, prosperity, religious meaning, and many blessings, and that we may all feel spiritual uplift, continuing into the years ahead.
