

Rabbi's Message

Shalom & greetings!

A Difficult Time. This is the Bulletin article for December. I write in a very somber mood. The recent past has been a difficult time in many ways, certainly following the events of Oct. 7 in Israel; continuing through the justified response of Israel to that terrorist attack, with the tragedy of the loss of lives in Gaza due to Hamas using civilians as living shields to try to prevent any effective response by Israel; exacerbated by the indefensible reactions of many people, nations, and international organizations who want Israel to simply serve as a sitting duck target, absorbing whatever is done to it and doing nothing to prevent it or cause it to stop; and more specifically, including horrendous and hate filled words and actions in many places, not least of which have been in the United States, and particularly troubling, on campuses, in numerous verbal and physical attacks on Jewish students and professors for no reason except the hate born of antisemitism.

Adding to the pain and insult has been the piling on of those with whom we have worked for years to further joint goals of seeking a more just world, but who have now shown that this goal does not apply to us in their hearts; and most painful of all, seeing that there are some in the secular and even the Jewish world who value the lives of Jews so lightly or not at all. This is not an easy time for Jews – many of us are hurting, and we find little comfort.

I say little – but I want to emphasize that <u>there IS some</u>, because we are hearing from people in our communities who express their support and concern for us locally, in Israel, and everywhere. We take heart in their reaching out to us, we are deeply grateful, and we feel blessed by their concern and care. We thank them, and pray that these good people be blessed for their kindness and compassion. We pray that we may work with them to make a better and more godly world in the days ahead.

We take heart also in the gathering of close to 300,000 Jews on the Mall in Washington, D.C. on Nov. 14 to demand the safe return of hostages, to express support for the state of Israel, and to speak out against hatred, bigotry, and antisemitism. May the voices raised there, and by those supporters who were not able to be present, be heard loudly and clearly, and may those in positions of power or authority listen and respond appropriately.

We pray for an end to terrorism and hatred, the safe return of all hostages and captives, and a cessation of bloodshed, war, and death, with a lasting peace for all who seek it – in Israel, in Gaza, and everywhere in the world. Ken yehi ratzon (may it be so, soon).

The events of the world do not change the fact that things continue in ou<u>r</u> small corner of it, and in many ways, as we approach Thanksgiving, we still have a great deal to make us grateful. I have already mentioned that we have received many positive messages of support and expressions of concern, a truly overwhelming show from many in our community.

In addition to the support coming from the larger community, I am deeply appreciative that we have a congregation and a Jewish community that is so connected and caring, making this a warm and vibrant home that welcomes each of us, and any others who come to this area. For a Jewish community the size of Charleston and the Kanawha Valley, and including our members in the Parkersburg-Marietta area, we are both fortunate and blessed to have the rich diversity and variety of Jewish and secular events spanning cultural, religious, educational, culinary, and social realms. I have felt especially grateful to find that no matter where I have gone, I have felt warmly welcomed, and I hope that is so for everyone. This is a lovely community, and a tiny gem shining out brightly in the world. If only this were the experience of all everywhere!

I will count these among the many blessings I enjoy as I gather with family and friends for the Thanksgiving holiday that is just around the corner as I write this, and these are the feelings I will carry forward as we enter the celebration of the holiday of lights. I often find myself

Loop Technology Further Update

I mentioned the Loop Technology installed in the sanctuary last month. It is still there and functioning, but I have since been told that newer hearing aids do not include the capability to tune in (in order to make them smaller), so that option may not be available directly. However, there are **receivers in the choir loft area, with earphones**, so you can still use the system. Ask the tech crew about them if you want to use them at a service.

Sisterhood Message More sharing of Sisterhood's history from leaders who are still active and glad to be of service to the congregation

It felt like old home week to chat with Betty and David Stern regarding their combined years of membership and service to Temple Israel. In fact, the two were married at The Daniel Boone Hotel because the "new" Temple on Kanawha Boulevard was still under construction (you do the math).

Betty and I grew up in Charleston's East End, attended the same schools, belonged to same religious youth groups, and even played together on the B'nai Jacob girls basketball team in the 1950s. We laughed about how girls only played on half of the court then (the weaker sex, I'm guessing). Well, Betty was pretty good, a starter and scorer, while I do not recall being let off the bench.

David came from Weston, W.Va.,

and the couple met at WVU. Settling in Charleston where both taught school at first, Betty worked many years at The Art Store with Sherry Lovett and Ellie Schaul. All along, Betty was active in Temple Sisterhood as well as many community causes.

Serving as Sisterhood President in 1985-87, Betty described her first Sisterhood experience as working in the kitchen carefully forming butter pats on a plate while supervised by one of the older ladies as leaving a lasting impression on her. Some scenes like this are easily visualized.

The Friday night service's Oneg Shabbat reception can be attributed to Betty, as she was responsible for making it a weekly mainstay during her presidency. Betty's mother was a Sisterhood member when the ladies needed to separate the Holland bulbs from large bundles before distribution.

David's many years as our musical director began in 1964 when he was called in as a substitute. No one can even imagine services without him now. He is truly our "music man."

Reminiscing with Betty and David was indeed a trip down memory lane, when young couples returned to Charleston after college to begin careers and families. As David said, "we were the young ones." It was a heyday for both of Charleston's Jewish congregations with filled seats, bustling Sunday schools, and youth groups. Several ladies' groups existed then also.

Betty has been a rock in our Sisterhood fulfilling many unsung jobs. She is Sisterhood's "forever Treasurer" and cochairs our extremely active Helen F. Thalheimer Care Committee. She is that quiet entity who always gets the job well done. "Call Betty" is a familiar phrase when it comes to getting
