Rabbi's Message

Shalom & greetings!

This is the bulletin for April 2024, written in mid-March. That month came in like a lamb, and I am hoping it remains so as we move on into April. It seems only appropriate that we have just concluded our observance of Purim, and are now looking forward to Passover, known as the Spring Holiday! For me, the arrival of Passover is a sign that we should be thinking about enjoying the outdoors and the beautiful scenery while the weather is gorgeous – before it becomes too hot and humid to take pleasure in being out and about.

Calendar News

Recent Highlights. There have been many. I always enjoy the classes we share, and I have had fun with Torah Study; Death While Dining; A Bissell Torah; Jewish Literature; a visit from students at the University of Pikeville; the WVU Osher Lifelong Learning Institute course on Psalms as Poetry, and many others. I also note the annual ritual of submitting information to craft a budget for the congregation based on plans for what we will be doing in the next fiscal year.

Looking Ahead. April will be full! In addition to regular services each Friday: A Bissell Torah (weekly); Jewish Literature; Torah Study; and Death While Dining. The big event is Passover. The Congregational Seder, held on the first night – will be on Monday, April 22. Pre-paid RSVPs are a must – we cannot accept payments at the door, and no admission without one.

Following Passover, we enter the time of the counting of the Omer – tying

Passover and Redemption to Shavuot and Revelation. Following Passover and entering the month of May, we have the Yom HaShoah service (held at Temple Israel, conducted jointly with B'nai Jacob); the Sisterhood Shabbat and Officer Installation service, celebrating the important role that the Sisterhood plays in the life of the congregation; the Shabbat service that includes Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'Atzma'ut; a Shabbat service which includes observance of Pesach Sheni; and looking into early June, we have the Annual Congregational Meeting and Shavuot. This is all in addition to our regular events, services, and meetings.

Thoughts, Blessings, and Salutations

Just as Spring brings thoughts of nicer weather, our calendar at this time of year offers us reasons to feel hope and joy.

Purim was a celebration of playfulness, and a sense that justice may prevail in the world, even when things look very dark.

As we approach Passover, we are offered a way to focus on the twin joys of Redemption and Salvation, with the

message that things can change. The counting of the Omer reminds us that we can move from moments of redemption and salvation to the peak of Revelation and a close encounter with the divine.

Yom HaShoah is paradoxically a boost for our spirits – even as we look back on tragedy and terror that destroyed much of the Jewish world at that time, we use that memory to strengthen our spirits and provide resolve to take the actions necessary to make the phrase “never again” a reality (though we have far to go yet).

Events like Sisterhood Shabbat remind us that we are part of a congregation and a Jewish community that is vital and vibrant.

Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'Atzma'ut – respectively, Memorial Day and Independence Day in Israel – remind us that after many centuries, Jews are finally self-governing in their own land, but that we are not only a religious people that has existed for thousands of years, but also recognized as a nation among the nations of the world, and even when that causes us to worry or despair, it is an important restoration of our nationhood and our peoplehood.

Pesach Sheni, the second Passover, reminds us that we are not held to an

impossible standard, but must do our best, and there are leniencies in our faith that recognize our limitations.

Shavuot, of course, is the time of Revelation – our encounter with the divine, and the receiving of the gift of Torah to guide our steps as we live. All of these, and all of them together, offer us reasons to celebrate, rejoice, and to appreciate all that we have now and all that we will have in future.

May you and your loved ones find great joy and deep meaning in these and other Jewish occasions that are on the calendar. Ken yehi ratzon.

Sisterhood Message

A woman for all seasons

Please answer this question: Name the secretary of the Temple Israel Sisterhood who has served for 17 years; also served as the secretary to the Temple board of trustees for 11 years; who for many years has been the editor of our yearbook, that all-important little directory of vital Temple information on which we rely; chair of the Temple’s Ritual Committee and the Sisterhood’s Nominating Committee, year after year.

Who is this Wonder Woman who wears many hats at Temple Israel? You have probably guessed – yet Ronni Spudich is virtually unsung and has filled all these many positions with ease and flow.

It was my pleasure to discuss the Sisterhood and the Temple with Ronni, for she could just as easily also hold title as our historian as well. Ronni moved to West Virginia, specifically Charleston, to attend what was then Morris Harvey College (aka University of Charleston). While getting her undergraduate degree there, and later a masters in Counseling at the College of Graduate Studies, she met and married her husband, and never left. For that, we are more than lucky.

Ronni’s involvement with Sisterhood began with her representing us on the Kanawha Valley Interfaith Council Coordinating Board. Temple Israel Sisterhood is a founding member of this group. Ronni became KVIC secretary in the 1990s, and continued until the Covid-19 pandemic forced the group into inactivity.

Ronni credits Sisterhood’s late president Lois Phillips Coleman as the mentor and friend who encouraged her to become more active and involved in Sisterhood leadership. With Lois’s encouragement and support, Ronni became a member of the Sisterhood board, leading to her becoming Sisterhood Secretary, Vice President, and President 2007-2010, a three-year extended term.

During Ronni’s presidency, Sisterhood published “Kitchen Mavens,” a congregation-sourced cookbook (edited by Roberta Lee Levine) that generated the funds used to decorate our Sisterhood lounge where we enjoy our monthly Schmooze and our board meetings

Another of Ronni’s unsung responsibilities at the Temple is to ensure, weekly, that the Shabbat candle blessing/candle lighting honor is offered to members, so they can participate in the Shabbat service. Ronni helped plan the Sisterhood-sponsored Break-fast on Yom Kippur for over 13 years, and has

served on several of the congregation’s Rabbi Search committees.

I know that during my own Sisterhood presidency, whenever I need information or guidance regarding bylaws or any protocol, I can rely on Ronni. She is a “one call” source for sound advice.

On top of all Ronni's various and long-term positions at our Temple, she has held leadership positions in several community services such as the Charleston Job Corps Center, and the Charleston YWCA’s Sojourners Shelter for Homeless Women and Families. Also, her community involvement serving on numerous local boards through the years has been impressive.

So, when Ronni plainly states, “I love the Temple,” she is not understating her huge commitment over many years. And I believe we love her back.

Temple & Sisterhood members: deadline for pre-paid Passover Seder RSVPs: 3 PM April 12th

Sisterhood board and general membership meeting April 14 to feature a luncheon and program with two guest speakers

Sisterhood’s board and general membership meeting, luncheon, and program will be held Sunday, April 14. The business meeting will begin at 11 AM, when Sisterhood will conduct its election of officers and adopt its 2024-2025 budget. The luncheon and program will follow, beginning at approximately 11:30.

Temple members are welcome and encouraged to attend the luncheon and program. The luncheon is free and you don’t need to make a reservation.

The program will feature two speakers:

The first, Sarah Gottlieb, will share news about local efforts of the nationwide faith-based initiative, Guns to Gardens, which seeks to transform surrendered firearms into gardening tools, and grew out of

the public response to the Sandy Hook school mass shooting in 2012. Sisterhood, along with the Temple’s Social Action Committee, provided a combined \$200 to help get the local group started. At the April 14 meeting, Sarah will report on progress and announce an upcoming outreach in the Kanawha Valley to be held later this spring.

The second speaker will be Del. Kayla Young (D-Kanawha 56th), House Minority Leader Pro Tempore. Del. Young will give updates on the outcomes of gun control legislation and legislation affecting women and families, introduced in the 2024 regular session of the West Virginia Legislature. The 56th District includes parts of Charleston, South Charleston, and St. Albans.

Synagogue de Saint-Avoid, Table du Séder de Pessa'h

The Saint-Avoid Synagogue is a Jewish synagogue at the corner of Rue des Americains and Rue de la Mertzelle near Place Paul-Collin in Saint-Avoid, France. The current synagogue building, completed in 1956, replaces a nearby synagogue destroyed during the German occupation of France in World War II. - *Wikipedia*
