As I write this, we have just completed the Yom HaShoah service and the Sisterhood Shabbat and Officer Installation.

The Yom HaZikaron and Yom HaAtzma'ut service is this week, and Pesach Sheni is next Shabbat.

As you can see, we have had a VERY busy time this month; but it was well worth it to be able to celebrate and worship in community with all of you.

Recent Highlights

May 5th was the unveiling for the monument for Natalie Mendeloff Winowich – it was lovely to see people gather to honor her memory.

That same evening, we held a joint observance of Yom HaShoah with B'nai Jacob at Temple Israel. This year felt particularly heavy; I felt that it was somber, but moving, and hope others felt similarly.

May 10th was the Sisterhood Shabbat service with Officer Installation – a lovely event, and very happy! Thanks to all who participated – and as always, thanks to the members of the Sisterhood.

We observed Yom HaZikaron and Yom HaAtz'ma'ut in the service on May 17th. In today's climate, it feels important to take any opportunity to celebrate Israel and Israelis – and we did.

Jewish Literature was on May 19th with an interesting choice for the reading. A lively discussion followed. We will pick up again in the fall.

The Spring WVU OLLI course on Spring Events took place, meeting on May 21 and May 28. Lots of fun and conversation.

The Pesach Sheni (2nd Passover) was observed in our service on May 24th.

Looking Ahead

A very brief note of what is coming:

June 2nd is both Torah Study (Parashah Nasso, Num 4:21-7:89) and Death While Dining. June 5th is the annual Congregational Meeting. The Festival of Weeks, Shavuot, begins the evening of June 11th at sundown; we will include observance in our Shabbat service on June 14th. The Charleston Jewish Film Festival is on Sunday, June 16th.

Musings

As we continue our measured progress through the period of the counting of the Omer leading us to Shavuot, may we find meaning, purpose, and spiritual nourishment in the counting and recounting of these days, and take into our hearts the Sefirot (Emanations or Attributes of the Divine) that we use as markers to keep track of our inner journey and the progress we hope to achieve during this time. May we arrive at Shavuot in a state of readiness and openness, so that we may once again merit the gifts of Torah and Revelation that holiday represents.

May Pesach Sheni (2nd Passover falling on May 22nd) help us to feel the compassionate and gracious offer of a second chance to fulfill what is required of us.

May the arrival of the month of Elul on Sept. 4th, our annual call to focus inwards and upwards, stir us to redirect ourselves and choose the path that is right for us.

May all these events and times work within and upon us to raise our spirits, rekindle our sense of purpose, fill us with hope and optimism, heighten our awareness of joy, and open our eyes to the wonders, miracles, and blessings among which we walk each day.

And may we each be blessed with joys, health, and a life filled with deeds of lovingkindness.
