A communal commemoration of October 7<sup>th</sup> was held on Monday, with a showing of the documentary film *Beyond October 7<sup>th</sup>*, followed by a brief service, led by Rabbi Urecki and me.

Regular business continued as well, with the monthly Temple Israel Board of Directors meeting on October 8<sup>th</sup>.

Yom Kippur fell on Friday night and Saturday, October 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>, with a total of five services included. It was intense, but as I said above, I hope it was spiritually uplifting and emotionally fulfilling.

Kudos to those involved with the Breakthe-Fast that evening (Sisterhood members and others) – it was lovely. Plenty to eat, and lots of good conversation to start the new year off with a wonderful time.

I also wanted to note that we had a robust group who joined our services for the High Holidays online. Thank you for choosing to be part of our congregation during these special days.

Only a few days later, we entered into the holiday of Sukkot, which was celebrated in our Shabbat service on 10/18. Sukkot concluded the following week, and we observed Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah in our Shabbat service on 10/25, including a reading of verses from Deuteronomy (Dev. 34), and Genesis (Ber. 1), completing the reading of the Torah and immediately beginning it anew. The extra reading assigned for that week is from Numbers (Bam. 29:35-30:1) - we did not include that in the reading at this service, but it may be of interest to know that it is usually included. That service also acknowledged the attack on the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh.

On October 28<sup>th</sup>, there was a celebration of life for Dr. Steven J. Jubelirer at CAMC. The Jewish community was invited, along with his medical colleagues and other CAMC staff. There may be a larger event for the general public at a future date.

Meantime, all other regular events continued; Sisterhood Schmooze took place on October 14<sup>th</sup>, the Ritual

We have completed the Harvest Festival on the Jewish calendar (Sukkot), which celebrates the harvest that we enjoy of fruits, vegetables, nuts, and other produce. This is the religious observance that encourages us to acknowledge and express gratitude for all that we enjoy and benefit from in our world. As we move forward in this season, we come to the secular holiday that focuses on the same themes. May we each be blessed with health, love, prosperity, and a life filled with deeds of lovingkindness, and bring us to serve as a blessing to each other and to the world.


#### Thank You for Making Shabbat Even More Special

## SISTERHOOD MESSAGE: OUR JILL OF ALL TRADES

Jill Epstein, Sisterhood Vice President, arrived in Charleston in January, 1992, as a department manager for Kaufman's in the Mall. Leaving her home town and family in New Castle, PA, was a big step, especially to hear her describe how she found the Mall minus a GPS at the time.

Prior to that, Jill had management training in the Pittsburgh Kaufman's and those skills have served her well in subsequent positions, including her excellent handling of House Manager for Temple Israel.

Jill, being one of twenty grandchildren on her paternal side of the family, admits to being her grandmother's favorite, along with her personal shopper. I'm guessing that Jill's relationship with this particular grandmother evidences her somewhat "old soul" as she bonds well with people quite a bit older in our Temple community (including myself).

It was a chance discussion with Alan Fleischmann in his store that brought Jill to Temple Israel services in May 2015. Alan suspected that Jill was a "member of the tribe" and encouraged her to come to our Temple. Thank you, Alan.

Jill recalls being warmly welcomed by Judy Lundy and Ronni Cohen Spudich. They encouraged her to come up front and sit with them. The "helper quality" in Jill shone through quickly. She said it was automatic for her to start clearing tables at the Chanukah dinner. Jill's several waitressing jobs from high school to when she attended Penn State U certainly prepared her for always being a "helper."

Jill and David McAfee became fast friends. To this day they

work as a team doing anything and everything for Temple Israel. Shopping for and preparing for our Shabbat Oneg is a staple activity for them, along with a myriad of other things that keep the Temple running smoothly.

As a member at large on the Sisterhood Board under three Presidents which adds up to six years, Jill accepted the position of Sisterhood Veep working with President Ina Angel...a very good team keeping Sisterhood in the best of hands.

At the time when Jill first entered our Temple, she admits to a missing link in her life...Faith, which she happily found within the Temple walls. She feels honored to be our House Chairperson with all the responsibilities that come with that unsung position. Jill's motto is "never ask anyone to do anything you wouldn't do yourself." And she lives up to that standard daily. Her full-time job at American Electric Power Call Center servicing eleven states fulfills her passion for hard and meaningful work, and many wonder how she does it.

Asking Jill how she feels about our aging Jewish community and Temple membership she said "scary." It would be nice if more people her age would find their way to our Congregation. Perhaps they could discover what Jill found here.

#### RABBINIC SEARCH UPDATE

In June of 2025, the existing employment contract with our Rabbi Joe Blair will expire.

Our options are: renew Rabbi Blair's contract, partner with B'nai Jacob Synagogue, hiring one rabbi for both congregations, or hire a new rabbi altogether. For the last 3 weeks, the nucleus of a Search Committee has been working to refine and define the application required by Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR). Our legal minds have been asked to clarify the language and now the application is ready for submission

Rabbi Blair has indicated he would like to be considered for his position again. He will have that opportunity. We are also exploring the possibility of sharing a rabbi with B'nai Jacob, as our membership continues to dwindle. Temple Israel membership is expected to drop to unsustainable levels in less than a decade.

A Search Committee has been formed to consider all possibilities. The members are: Ina Angel, Josh Barrett, Mary Rich Maloy, Steve Artz, Richard Gottlieb, Gayle Twigger-Shaw, and Cookie Glasser.

Temple Israel members will be kept fully informed and are asked to provide feedback at all times. It is crucial for us to maintain open communication. No decisions will be made without the knowledge of the congregation.


