FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Shalom & greetings!

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT, COMFORT, AND HOPE

Events in the larger world beyond our congregation have been difficult for many, affecting them emotionally, with deep divisions and strong reactions, leading some to experience feelings of disconnection, isolation, fear, anger, and even despair. Neither the reasons for these responses, nor the appropriateness of them, are for anyone else to judge. It is enough that we know that people around us feel this way. No one should be dismissing the feelings, or minimizing them, or even ridiculing them. Instead, we should be looking beyond the sources that engendered the feelings, and seeking to see the person that has them, the human being that is, to some degree, hurting or suffering, an individual who is as is each of us - made in the image of the divine.

What this calls for from us is something we talk about often, but even more often find difficult to do; that is to have compassion, and to be kind. Whether we have the same feelings or not, whether we even understand what prompts the feelings is not the point. It is simply that we are called to offer support and caring for another person, and to treat them kindly, with respect, knowing that they, too, are containers for the holy, divine spark of the creator.



We cannot 'fix' the situation for them, or change them in any way, but we can give them the gift of ourself – of being present, accepting that they are feeling as they do, and recognizing our common humanity, with the hope that reaching out in this way will offer them a ray of light in a dark time, and help them feel that there can be hope, and things will seem better.

It seems a small thing, but that tiny spark of light can drive back the darkness and illumine the way to a safe space; in the same way that the light of the Hanukiah does - and seeing a light, however small or dim, gives rise to hope that as dark as it seems, there is a possibility for something better to come about. It is a manifestation of the idea that even in the darkest moments, when all seems lost, it is still possible to believe that this darkness will not last forever, and the time of distress will pass, as all things do. That, my friends, is the core of hope, and hope can lift a person out of despair. So the message is: be kind, be present, and be a source of light to others when they are seeing darkness.

CALENDAR

From the vantage point of the middle of November, we have moved from the High Holiday level of activity to a more 'normal' level, and settled down quite a bit. Our calendar from here on is full with the expected events; weekly Shabbat services, Board Meetings, Sisterhood meetings, Oneg Shabbat, and scheduled classes and programs.

Looking ahead after Thanksgiving, towards special observances and holidays, we will have each of these take place in the coming months.

- Hanukkah at the end of December into the start of January
- Tu B'Shevat in mid-February
- The NCJW Reproductive Rights Shabbat in late February
- Purim in mid-March
- Passover in mid-April, followed by Yom HaShoah
- Yom Hazikaron and Yom HaAtzma'ut at the end of April - beginning of May.
- Sisterhood Shabbat and officer installation falls in early-May

- Pesach Sheni in mid-May
- Shavuot at the end of May into the start of June.
- The annual Congregational meeting is scheduled for June 4th
- The 3rd Annual Indoor Picnic Oneg Shabbat is mid-June

And with that, we arrive at the end of the Congregational calendar year.

I always enjoy sharing these events with others, so I hope to see you at some or all of these events, or at any special or additional events we hold beyond these. Whether you are here in person or attending online, I value your presence and participation as a member of the Congregation and community.

RECENT HIGHLIGHTS

After the burst of activities (the holiday season) that filled most of October, anything would look less crazy! So even though November has been active, it felt a bit like a reprieve from the frenetic pace of the preceding month.

Again, that is not to say we were not busy or active this month: we had many events that we folded into our services, including Krystallnacht and Veterans Day, which we observed on November 8th together.

Meantime, all other regular events continued; Sisterhood Schmooze, a Temple Board of Trustees meeting, Shabbat services were held every

Following the entire period of the High Holy Days, we have entered into Cheshvan - the unique month in the Jewish calendar, because unlike all the other months, there is no special holiday that falls during this time. It is thought by some to be a time of sadness because we do not have anything to celebrate, but I hold with those who feel differently. Rather than a lack of reasons to rejoice, this strikes me as a pause in the calendar of holidays that allows us to stop for a moment, recognize that without any external 'reasons' to celebrate, we are still so very blessed by our 'ordinary' life, and should feel grateful for all that we have been granted. It is a quieter time, and perhaps a less boisterous

feeling of gratitude, but there is so much around us to celebrate in all the ordinary everyday miracles that make up our world. A more thoughtful time, and an opportunity to recognize the bounty that surrounds us and sustains us at all times.

May this quieter time bring each of us the awareness to enjoy all these gentle blessings and joys, and at the same time, may it help to raise our spirits, nourish our souls, rekindle our sense of purpose, serve to fill us with hope and optimism, and heighten our awareness of joy, so that we can open our eyes to the wonders, miracles, and blessings among which we walk each day, often without noticing.

We are about to embark on the holiday of Hanukkah, the festival of lights. May the holy light of that holiday join the lights that we kindle with our Hanukkiot, and spread far and wide through the darkness to enlighten our world and our souls, so that the light that shines can be the vehicle for divine light to enter the world and enlighten all of creation.

In this way, may we each be blessed with a sense of closeness to the divine, as well as health, love, prosperity, and a life filled with deeds of lovingkindness, which can all serve to bring us to be a blessing to each other and to the world.




