FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Shalom & greetings!

CALENDAR

As I write this, we have just finished our Tu B'Shevat Social Action service. It was wonderful that so many people were willing to participate in the service, and it was lovely to see you all.

Many thanks to the Social Action Committee members for turning out, a huge shout out to Jill Epstein, David McAfee, Tasha Medley, and Na'Jah Shaffer-Tatum, from the House Committee for all their work in shopping, setting up, and cleaning up; to Melissa Bart, Office Administrator, for her assistance in getting readings and handouts ready; and a special thanks to Cookie Glasser, Rachel Dash, and Harriet Deutsch, all of whom I saw working hard in the kitchen to make the dinner that followed the service - and I am sure others also helped (I apologize - I simply don't know all who were involved, but please know that it was deeply appreciated).

Coming up next Shabbat is the Sisterhood NCJW Reproductive Rights Shabbat, and, again, many thanks to Ina Angel and the members of Sisterhood for turning out and taking part in the service.

We have a guest speaker for that service: Ramsie Monk from the WV Women's Health Center will deliver the Devar Torah for that evening.

February is designated as National Disabilities Awareness and Inclusion month; we are among the fortunate congregations that have been able to provide some accommodations, which is a blessing.

The weekend of February 21-23 was designated as Evolution Shabbat; a sabbath when it is encouraged to talk about how both Religion and Science co-exist and are compatible with each other. This started in light of the assertions that you could only be either religious, or accept the concepts that science offered about evolution and the place of humans in the cosmos. For over twenty years, scientists and

pastors of all denominations and faiths have developed sermons, homilies, divrei Torah, events, programs, and teachings that support the idea that these two different approaches can both be supported, and need not contradict each other. I have proudly participated in this as often as possible (when other events did not preempt the dates, as happened this year).

That brings us to the end of February, and we look ahead to March, and beyond.

Passover begins on Saturday evening, April 12th — at which time we will hold the Congregational Seder.

LOOKING AHEAD

On the calendar scheduled for March:

- There will be NO Bisell Torah on March 6th. We will return to our usual weekly schedule on March 13th.
- The Shabbat Service for Shabbat Zachor on March 7th will be lay-led; Josh Barrett has agreed to lead the service that evening, with David and Bob on music.
- Daylight saving time starts Sunday, March 9th. This is "Spring Ahead," so we turn the clocks forward and lose an hour overnight.
- Torah Study on Sunday morning, March 9th, Parashah Ki Tisa [Ex 30:11-34:35].
- Death Chatter on Sunday evening, March 9th.
- Shabbat service March 14th with Torah, Parashah Ki Tisa, Purim observed, and a guest speaker for the service: Andrew Schneider from Fairness WV will be with us that evening to share some information about the WV legislature, and plans and hopes for this year, and he will be joining us for the covered dish dinner that follows the service. [This was rescheduled from an earlier date.]
- Jewish literature is scheduled for March 16th at 4:00 p.m. online.

- March 21st we will have our Shabbat Service, Shabbat Parah, with HIAS Refugee Shabbat observed. [This was rescheduled from an earlier date.]
- March 28th is Shabbat HaChodesh.

Looking beyond March, we have several upcoming events of note.

- April 11th is Shabbat HaGadol, the Sabbath preceding the start of Passover.
- Passover begins on Saturday evening, April 12th at which time we will hold the Congregational Seder. The holiday runs until sundown on Saturday, April 19th (according to the Reform and Israeli reckoning, but one more day to sundown on Sunday, April 20th, for those who observe the holiday for eight days). The seder will be at 6:00 p.m. Watch for more details in your postal mailbox and the April Bulletin, including how to RSVP.
- The Sabbath on April 18th is Chol Ha'mo'ed Pesach, the Sabbath that falls during the week of Passover.
- Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) is from sundown April 23rd to sundown April 24th. There will be a communal observance of Yom HaShoah with a short service led by Rabbis Urecki and Blair on Wednesday, April 23rd at 6:00 p.m. More information and details will be forthcoming soon.
- Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'Atzma'ut (Israeli Memorial Day and Israeli Independence Day) fall on April 30th and May 1st, observed in our Shabbat service on May 2nd, which is followed by a covered dish dinner.
- Sisterhood Shabbat, with participation by members of Sisterhood, is on May 9th.
- L"ag B'Omer (33rd day of the Omer count) and Pesach Sheni (Second Passover) will be observed in the Shabbat service on May 16th.
- Shavuot will be observed in the Shabbat service on May 30th. The holiday officially falls Sunday evening to Tuesday sundown on June 1-3.
- The annual Congregational Meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, June 4th. This will include election of Trustees, and the approval of the budget for Congregational Year 2025 -2026 (July to June), and other business presented.
- The Third Annual Indoor Picnic Oneg Shabbat will follow the Shabbat service on June 13th.

In addition to all the services and special events, we continue our regular ongoing activities. These include not only the weekly Shabbat services, but also monthly Board of Trustees meetings, scheduled Sisterhood meetings, weekly Oneg Shabbatot (plural), and scheduled classes and programs.
