#### **CALENDAR**

The Shabbat on April 11<sup>th</sup> was Shabbat HaGadol, which falls immediately prior to Passover – and that was literally true, as Passover began on the evening of Saturday, April 12<sup>th</sup>, when we held the Congregational Seder. As I am writing this, we are in the midst of the week of Passover – I hope you are enjoying it!

The seder held at Temple Israel was absolutely lovely. We had enough people to make it feel like a congregational/communal event, but not so many that we lost any of the sense of warmth and intimacy, and the feeling of holding a "family gathering."

On top of that, the food was really wonderful, the setup was beautiful, and the people working on the event went above and beyond, making it perhaps the nicest seder I can recall in my time at Temple Israel.

Many thanks and even more kudos to Jill Epstein, Chair of the House Committee, and to all her crew (David McAfee, Tasha, Natalie, Nasyia, and Shakira [unfortunately, JJ was ill and could not be with us]) for the setup, serving, and clean up tasks; caterer Chasity Thomas and her employees at Tastefully Dun for all the behind-thescenes - food and serving; the seder plate arrangers (Jill Epstein, Beth Steinberg Winter, and David McAfee, as well as Tasha); our Matzah Ball Makers Supreme (Marsha Albert and Ina Angel), and the flower arrangers (Nasyia, Shakira, and Natalie). I also want to thank Melissa Bart, who did all the behind-the-scenes administrative work to deal with registrations and payments, and kept things (or at least me!) organized. [If I missed anyone, please forgive me and let me know so I can correct the oversight.]

Sunday, April 13<sup>th</sup>, B'nai Jacob held their Second Night Passover Seder – another wonderful event to celebrate Passover. Short and sweet, with a nice meal and Passover desserts to die for! Kudos to all who made that evening possible.

We will observe Yom HaZikaron (Israeli Memorial Day – falls on April 30<sup>th</sup>) and Yom Ha'Atzma'ut (Israeli Independence Day – falls on May 1<sup>st</sup>) in the Shabbat service on May 2<sup>nd</sup>.

The Shabbat of May 9<sup>th</sup> is scheduled as Temple Israel Sisterhood Shabbat.

Sisterhood Schmooze will meet again May 12<sup>th</sup> at 11:30 a.m.

There will also be a Sisterhood retreat for the Board of Directors in June, date TBA.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

Upcoming events of note:

- Already noted, Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'Atzma'ut (Israeli Memorial Day and Israeli Independence Day) are on April 30<sup>th</sup>and May 1<sup>st</sup>, observed in our Shabbat service on May 2<sup>nd</sup>.

#### THOUGHTS, BLESSINGS & SALUTATIONS

First and foremost, I want to express how much I appreciate all the expressions of comfort and condolence on the recent loss of my mother. I have accompanied many through this passage as a rabbi, but I have been given the privilege of not facing it personally very often - it is over thirty years since my father's death, and my recollection of that time is a bit hazy.

Israeli Memorial Day & Israeli Independence Day will be observed in our Shabbat service on May 2nd.

This has brought into sharp relief for me, again, what a gift and a blessing it is to have a supportive community, a congregational family, and friends who show their care and support. Thank you from the bottom of my heart.

With Passover in mid-April, we are experiencing beautiful weather and gorgeous blooms and greenery. It is a joy to be able to move about and see all the natural beauty and scenery locally and throughout our area and state. I certainly hope that you are taking full advantage of it, and enjoying this spring season.

We are in the midst of the period of the counting of the Omer, harkening back to the barley harvest in ancient days. This count has been used as a link between the holiday of Passover, which represents liberation and Redemption, with the holiday of Shavuot, which represents G-d's Instruction and the Revelation at Sinai. During this time, we not only move from Redemption to Revelation, we also seek to connect them on a spiritual level, so that we feel

both liberated from Pharaoh and enslavement in Mitzravim (the narrow place), and also supported and graced by the gift of G-d's instruction via the Torah, and both the written and oral law, as set forth in the Tanakh, Talmud, and the brilliant interpretations and implementation of these rules and instructions as a way of life and a guideline for how to live within G-d's Creation in accordance with the 'best practices' we have been taught.

I pray that we may each be comforted and blessed with the beauty and warmth of the season, and by the embrace of our congregation and community, and with health, love, prosperity, and a life filled with deeds of lovingkindness, which can all serve to bring us to be a blessing to each other and to the world.

As always, please remember to take every opportunity to be kind to those around you; it will make a difference and improve the world. There are so many reasons to feel down; raise your own spirits and those of everyone you encounter by sharing kindness and
