I always enjoy holding events with others, so I hope to see you at some or all of them, or at any special or additional events we hold beyond these classes and programs.

And please know: whether you are here in person or attending online, I value your presence and participation as a member of the Congregation and community. You are invited to participate however you wish - and however often you are able and wish to do so.


