PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I trust that the entire Congregation feels refreshed and renewed after our High Holidays services. I thought it particularly meaningful that so many Congregants were able to participate in the services. Following the High Holidays, we then celebrated Sukkot and Simchat Torah with great enthusiasm and joy. The Holidays never fail to make me appreciate our Jewish Heritage and renews my pledge to maintain that tradition in Charleston, WV, as long as we can.

In that regard, our Board of Trustees continue discussions regarding consolidation with that of B'nai Jacob. As I announced during Rosh Hashanah, we are now actively considering a proposed "Covenant" between the Congregations which outlines how a consolidated congregation could best function. This covenant recognizes that we will be able to retain and perpetuate the principles of Reform Judaism going forward. It is anticipated that the Temple Israel Board of Trustees will vote on whether to approve the Covenant by December 2025. Assuming that both the Temple Israel Board of Trustees and the Synagogue Board of Trustees agree upon the language of the Covenant, it would then be circulated to both Congregations for their consideration.

As always, please let me know if you have suggestions or comments with respect to the Temple activities.

- Jewish Literature, 11/2, 4:00 p.m.
- Death Chatter, 11/2, 7:00 p.m.
- Shabbat service with Krystallnacht and Veterans Day observed, Torah Parashah Vayera, with Covered Dish Dinner to follow, Friday, 11/7, 5:30 p.m.

You probably saw the messages sent out with the survey to assess interest for courses to be offered. This was in response to the Board of Trustees' request that I plan events that would take place in the building, and encourage people to come in person. Although some may wish to have online access to these, we do not have the technology to carry that off, so for now, we will have the same online options as in past, and add these as in person options. By the same token, those events that have been online will continue to be offered in that mode to accommodate those who attend who are not in a position to do so in person.

I suggested five options. I am very gratified – a significant number of people responded and indicated that they were interested and would attend. I tallied the results, and found that three of the options were the most frequently selected. As a result, I will add these options to the calendar, starting in November. The other two course options will be held in reserve, ready to be offered in the future. The courses to be offered will be:

- 1. Looking at one verse of Sacred Text through different lenses, based on a book by Rabbi Lawrence Kushner. The verse is Gen. 28:16, and we will look at how seven famous commentators might examine and understand this verse. Meeting (generally) on the third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m.
- 2. How to Get More Out of Judaism, Even if.... (based on the book by Gil Mann). This will be a six-session course, starting with the material in the chapters of the book, and ranging from there to open the conversation to the participants. Meeting (generally) on the first Wednesday of each month at 10:00 a.m.
- 3. Ask the Rabbi. This is a "catchall," open to questions raised, or

shorter topics than a full course. We already have a few suggestions for topics from the survey, but we will try to make room to look into whatever is a question that participants want to explore. Meeting (generally) on the third Wednesday of each month at 10:00 a.m.

To be clear, the online options offered in past will continue as they had been. These include:

- Torah Study, Sunday morning at 10:30 a.m., generally on the Sunday prior to the first Friday Shabbat. We will study the parashah for the coming Shabbat.
- Jewish Literature, Sunday afternoon at 4 p.m., generally on the first Sunday of each month.
- Death Chatter, Sunday evening at 7 p.m., generally on the first Sunday of each month.
- A Bisell Torah, Thursday afternoons at 4:30 p.m., generally weekly (depending on holidays and other events that conflict with this time).

Rabbi Berman will begin the Torah and Talmud classes that Rabbi Urecki and I led in the past. Torah class is at 10:00 a.m. Tuesdays in person weekly at B'nai Jacob, and Talmud class is 10:00 a.m. Thursdays online weekly.

I also plan to continue to offer WVU Osher Lifelong Learning Institute classes each semester; the dates and times will vary, but they have usually been during the midday. Watch for more information about these when they are scheduled. [One is scheduled for 10/30 and 11/6 in the Fall Semester; another is planned for 2/5, 2/12, and 2/19; registration is still open.]

ONGOING ACTIVITIES

These include monthly Board of Trustees meetings, scheduled Sisterhood meetings, weekly Ongei Shabbat (plural), and the return of scheduled classes and programs (i.e., A Bisell Torah, Leora May Book Group).

For more details on scheduled events and activities, see the At-a-Glance and Religious Events listings in this bulletin – and because things can and often do change after the bulletin is published, the most up to date information is to be found in the Reminder Links emails sent on Sundays and Thursdays, and on the Temple Israel website calendar – templeisraelwv.org.

SISTERHOOD | COMMUNITY TZEDAKAH


